SUBJECT'S CURRENT STATUS

James HARRIS is currently housed at CHCF, serving the first of two consecutive sentences of Life Without the Possibility of Parole from Los Angeles County for two counts of Murder 1st [Penal Code (PC) 187], two counts of Kidnapping [PC 207(a)] with an enhancement for Armed with a Firearm [PC 12022(a)(1)]. He was convicted on December 23, 1994, and was received by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation on January 9, 1995. He is currently not eligible for a parole suitability hearing. HARRIS' co-defendant was sentenced to 19 years and 8 months. During his 28 years of incarceration, HARRIS has received only two RVRs, neither for violent activity. HARRIS participated in the Progressive Programming Facility at LAC between 2010 and February 2018 before transferring to CHCF. He has obtained his GED. And since 1997 he has consistently participated in programming, work, and education. HARRIS has laudatory chronos from several staff members. One Correctional Officer stated, HARRIS' "conduct has been exemplary as he is both positive and productive in his activities and attitude."

Eddie Joe Hewitt (J-36959) was convicted of two counts of Voluntary Manslaughter [PC 192(a)] and two counts of Kidnapping [PC 207(a)] with an enhancement for a Prior Felony Conviction [PC 667(a)]. He was convicted in this matter and sentenced to 19 years and 8 months. He is currently housed at the Correctional Training Facility.

The bases of the appeals were ineffective assistance of counsel, prosecutorial and judicial misconduct, and being denied the right to confront the witnesses against him.

Facts of the Commitment Offense:

According to the Los Angeles County Probation Officer's Report (POR) dated November 3, 1994, on December 16, 1988, at approximately 12:30 p.m., the victims, and went to Jeffrey Kaminsky's apartment to sell him cocaine. Kaminsky alerted the co-defendants of the upcoming meeting because he believed was going to sell him cocaine that what stolen from HARRIS. HARRIS and co-defendant Hewitt came to the apartment and confronted was at gunpoint. Both victims were handcuffed and held captive for several hours. At approximately 6:30 p.m., while bound and gagged, each victim was forced into the trunk of a vehicle. Both vehicles were driven to the Mohave Desert. HARRIS shot was driven in the trunk of several miles away and removed from the trunk. HARRIS shot her in the back and pushed her down an embankment.

Criminal History:

A review of the POR and the California Identification and Information rap sheet reflects inmate HARRIS has no juvenile arrests or convictions. He has the following arrests and convictions as an adult:

November 5, 1986 November 10, 1987 Assault with Firearm on Person [PC 245(a)(2)]. Disposition: Dismissed. Trans/sell Narcotics [Health and Safety 11352]. Disposition: March 10, 1988 Released. Robbery [PC 211]. Disposition: Released. April 2, 1989

Institutional Adjustment:

He has received the following Rules Violation Reports:

Inmate HARRIS has participated in the following institutional programs and self-help groups: Channel Islands Bible College, Reformers Unanimous, Alternatives to Violence, Creating a Healing Society Program, House of Healing, Fundamentals of Business and Investing, Paving the Way, Alcoholics Anonymous, and Narcotics Anonymous. He is currently enrolled in Family Relationships, Criminal Thinking, and Anger Management.

The inmate's file holds seven laudatory chronos dating back to 2005, authored by various prison staff, including work supervisors, educational instructors, and correctional staff. Four of the chronos are regarding his attitude, work ethic, and positive demeanor. On January 9, 2018, Correctional Officer (CO) Woodard wrote HARRIS "not only leads by example and is a mentor in many of the rehabilitative programs ... he participates in many self-help groups and peer to peer classes, working to improve himself." On December 29, 2017, CO Keith wrote, "I have had numerous conversations with

HARRIS, and find that he has put a lot of thought into his spiritual beliefs, and outlook on his plans for the future ... he works well with others, while being a positive influence in a sometimes negative environment." Three chronos are for donations made to public relief efforts and memorial services.

HARRIS participated in the Progressive Programming Facility at California State Prison – Los Angeles County from 2010 to 2018. He has been assigned to the following jobs: office services, yard worker, painter, metal fabrication, porter, kitchen worker, and cook. He is currently assigned as a dog trainer. His work supervisor reports list his work at an overall satisfactory level. HARRIS obtained a General Education Diploma.

Documentation regarding the inmate's institutional adjustment has been included in the commutation file.

Other Factors:

Inmate HARRIS was interviewed on April 19, 2018, at CHCF. Prior to the interview, HARRIS was asked if he had any medical or mental health needs that required reasonable accommodations to participate in the interview process and he stated, "No."

He grew up in the "low bottoms" area of Los Angeles, California, and was raised by his mother, Pathre Lee Harris, with two brothers and two sisters. One brother passed away as an infant. He only saw his father, Henry Benjamin Harris, a few times when he was young. Both parents are deceased. The inmate maintains contact with his three remaining siblings. He believed he grew up in a normal home. He attended Nevens and Trinity Elementary Schools and John Adams Junior High School; he did "OK" academically. He started ditching school in the eighth grade. He attended Thomas Jefferson High School, but dropped out in the eleventh grade. At age 14, the inmate left home because he did not want to follow his mother's rules. He was selling marijuana to support himself; he sold joints on the bus for a dollar each. He was not a gang member, but they were everywhere in the neighborhood, so he associated with both the Bloods and the Crips.

Regarding his version of the crime, HARRIS said he lived in the San Fernando Valley area and was selling cocaine to support himself. The place he kept his drugs was robbed by victim was his friend and had taught HARRIS how to survive on the streets. owed cocaine to Jeffrey Kaminsky, a mutual associate. On the day of the murders, state called Kaminsky and told him he had narcotics to sell. Kaminsky called HARRIS and told him about the phone call and inquired if he should be afraid of HARRIS told him he should not, and he was coming over, was trying to sell Kaminsky belonged to HARRIS. He and knowing the drugs co-defendant Eddie Hewitt arrived at the apartment and waited. HARRIS pulled out a gun, tied them up and questioned stranger, victim about the drugs. and they were retrieved. The inmate and Hewitt then took and into the desert where HARRIS shot and killed both.

Regarding his institutional adjustment, he has had several assignments and taken many courses. He is taking bible college courses and hopes to earn his Associate of Arts degree in Biblical Counseling as an ordained minister.

When asked why he is seeking a commutation to his sentence, HARRIS said he is no longer the person who came to prison. He now has the courage to ask for mercy, based on his relationship with God. He wants to give back to the community, working with troubled youth and in a church. The inmate was asked if he deserves a commutation, and said the person who came to prison does not deserve anything. He is taking classes and helping in the prison to be a "light" in his surroundings and is asking for grace from the Governor. HARRIS believes he has a lot to give.

Regarding parole plans in the event he is released, HARRIS plans to initially go to transitional housing. He would then move in with his wife, Edlyn Harris, in

Moreno Valley. She is a public health nurse in San Bernardino. For employment, he would try to find work as a fork lift operator.

Pursuant to CCR, Title 15, Section 3290(c)(2), drug testing shall be conducted, "When mandatory random testing is known to the inmate to be a condition for the inmate's participation in a specific program, assignment, or activity." An initial drug test, and random drug testing thereafter, is a condition for participation in the PPF.

Pursuant to CSP-Los Angeles County (LAC), Operational Procedure #605, inmates being considered for placement or retention in the PPF program must fulfill the following requirements.

- a) Must have no documented activity in a prison gang or disrupted group/affiliation, in the past three (3) years, (member or associate).
- b) Must not have "sensitive needs" issues.
- c) Must manifest disposition to program.
- d) Must manifest willingness to program with inmates and staff of any race.
- e) Must have a record, which includes no serious CDC-115s (Divisions "A-1", "A-2", "B" or "C"), in the past three (3) years; no violence related incidents, (i.e., riots, or Division D battery or assault on staff or inmates, etc.) within the last three (3) years (115s for fighting will be assessed by UCC to determine if exclusionary factors exist based on pattern of violence). No work-related, CDC-115s, in the last three (3) years.
- f) Must be drug-free and have no drug paraphernalia related offenses while participating in the program.
- g) Must not be on C status or have been on C status within the past three (3) years.
- h) Must not be single cell status excluding Medical/Mental or inmates who meet the criteria for single cell placement per the Prison Rape Elimination Act.
- i) Must apply for the Progressive Programming Facility. (An integral part of the application form is a CDC-128-B Chrono stating willingness to conform to all the rules of the Progressive Programming Facility.
- j) Must agree to integrated housing and only coded RE.
- k) Must not have been assessed a SHU term, whether imposed or suspended, in the past three (3) years.
- I) Must be in full compliance with CCR Title 15, Section 3031, Neatness and Laundry Exchange.
- m) Must not have any violations for cell phones while participating in the Progressive Programming Facility.
- n) Must meet the criteria to be eligible for housing in a 270 design Level III housing unit.



I have been asked to respond on behalf of the Los Angeles Superior Court, to your letter dated April 24, 2018 with regard to the request for Executive Clemency by the above inmate.

A review of the court file reveals that the Defendant was convicted in 1994 of two felony counts of first degree murder in violation of Penal Code Section 187a and two felony counts of kidnapping in violation of Penal Code Section 207(a). Further, the jury found the special circumstances true that there were more than one murder of the first or second degree committed during the same proceeding in violation of Penal Code Section 190.2(a)(3) and that the murders were committed during the commission of a kidnapping in violation of Section 190.2(a)(17)(ii). The jury found that a principal was armed with a firearm during the commission of these crimes within the meaning of section 12022(a)(1).

It is uncontested that the victims, while the victim was been uncertained and gagged with duct tape while they were visiting at the apartment of one Jeff Kaminsky. The victims were removed from the apartment and each was placed in the truck of a separate vehicle, then driven to the Palmdale-Acton area where each was shot and left at a separate location. Each victim died of a single execution style gunshot wound to the head which was administered while the victim was still bound and gagged. Each were killed with the same gun, a .357 Magnum which belonged to Jeff Kaminsky. Jeff Kaminsky and two other men participated in the crime. The jury concluded that the above inmate was one of the three who participated in these gruesome crimes. He was sentenced to two consecutive life terms without the possibility of Parole for the murder counts.

After reviewing the court file and considering the above, the court declines to make a recommendation regarding executive clemency.

APPEAL from a judgment of the Los Angeles Superior Court, John Ouderkirk, Judge. Affirmed.

James Edward Harris appeals from his conviction by jury verdict of two counts of first degree murder with a special circumstance and kidnapping. He argues the trial court erred in denying his challenge to jury selection on the ground that no prima facie case was made; in refusing to appoint a particular attorney to represent him; in denying his request to cross-examine a prosecution witness about another witness' polygraph examination; in excluding expert testimony regarding eyewitness identification; and in allowing the untruthful testimony of his two accomplices. We find no basis for reversal and affirm.

FACTUAL AND PROCEDURAL SUMMARY

Appellant does not challenge the sufficiency of the evidence supporting his conviction. Therefore, we provide only a brief factual summary, applying the established standard of appellate review. We review the whole record in the light most favorable to the judgment below, and resolve conflicts in the evidence in favor of the prosecution. (*People v. Johnson* (1980) 26 Cal.3d 557, 578.)

The key witnesses gave slightly different accounts of the events which led to the crimes committed, each minimizing his own role. These differences are not germane to the issues presented on appeal, and therefore we need not discuss them in depth.

On December 16, 1988, Jeffrey Kaminsky, who dealt in drugs and prostitution, invited Alvin Crockett to his apartment in North Hollywood. Appellant had introduced Kaminsky to Crockett, but warned Kaminsky that he might be robbed if he bought drugs from Crockett. Based on that information, Kaminsky arranged for Karen Rose and appellant to come to his apartment that morning in order to reduce the risk of robbery. Appellant hid in a loft, armed with a gun.

Crockett arrived at Kaminsky's apartment, driving a Mercedes and accompanied by Karen Lee. Eddie Hewitt came to the apartment, armed with a gun. Crockett and Lee were taken prisoner and bound. Several hours passed, during which Crockett made telephone calls to obtain drugs which appellant and Hewitt claimed belonged to them. Eventually, Hewitt and appellant put Crockett in the trunk of the Mercedes and Lee was put into a red Hyundai owned by Hewitt's girlfriend. Hewitt and appellant left the apartment together in the red Hyundai. They instructed Kaminsky to follow in Crockett's Mercedes. The two vehicles traveled toward Palmdale, pulling off the Angeles Crest Highway.

Crockett was shot in the trunk of the Mercedes, which was left in a remote area. Lee was removed from the Hyundai, shot, and thrown down an embankment. A gun was thrown from the car. Appellant, Hewitt, and Kaminsky left in the Hyundai. They had a flat tire and stopped at a campground. They called a towing company, which towed the car back to Los Angeles.

Crockett and Lee died from gunshot wounds to the head. The shots had been fired from a gun which had been picked up in the area where the bodies were found.

Appellant was charged with two counts of first degree murder (Pen. Code, § 187, subd. (a))¹; two counts of kidnapping (§ 207, subd. (a)); and allegations that the principal used a firearm in the commission of the offenses (§ 12022, subd. (a)(1)) and that the murders occurred during the commission of the kidnappings (§ 190.2, subd. (a)(17)(B)). He was found guilty as charged by jury verdict and sentenced to two consecutive terms of life without parole plus a concurrent term of six years on one kidnapping count. The sentence on the other kidnapping count was stayed pursuant to section 654. Appellant filed a timely notice of appeal.

Ι

Wheeler Motion

Appellant argues *Wheeler* error (*People* v. *Wheeler* (1978) 22 Cal.3d 258): that the trial court erred in ruling he had not made a prima facie case that the prosecutor had

¹ All statutory references are to the Penal Code unless otherwise indicated.

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exercised peremptory challenges to prospective jurors based on racial bias. We find no error.

"'It is well settled that the use of peremptory challenges to remove prospective jurors solely on the basis of a presumed group bias based on membership in a racial group violates both the state and federal Constitutions." [Citations.] Under *Wheeler* and *Batson*, ""[i]f a party believes his opponent is using his peremptory challenges to strike jurors on the ground of group bias alone, he must raise the point in timely fashion and make a prima facie case of such discrimination to the satisfaction of the court. First, ... he should make as complete a record of the circumstances as is feasible. Second, he must establish that the persons excluded are members of a cognizable group within the meaning of the representative cross-section rule. Third, from all the circumstances of the case he must show a *strong likelihood* that such persons are being challenged because of their group association" [Citations.]" (*People* v. *Davenport* (1995) 11 Cal.4th 1171, 1199-1200, italics in original.)

"When a trial court denies a *Wheeler* motion because it finds no prima facie case of group bias was established, the reviewing court considers the entire record of voir dire. [Citation.] 'If the record "suggests grounds upon which the prosecutor might reasonably have challenged" the jurors in question, we affirm.' [Citations.]" (11 Cal.4th at p. 1200.)

The prosecutor exercised peremptory challenges to eight jurors. Appellant's attorney made a *Wheeler* motion on the ground that the prosecutor was basing the challenges on racial bias because seven of the eight were Black.² The trial court observed that of the 12 jurors in the box at the time, seven were Black. Appellant's attorney expressed his concern that only nine prospective jurors remained, of whom two were Black and one was Oriental. The trial court responded: "Well, *Wheeler* does not go by

² At the conclusion of jury selection, the trial court made a record of the race of each juror challenged by the prosecution. The trial court identified six as Black, one as White and one as Hispanic. We adopt the trial court's identifications for our discussion.

numbers alone and it's the court's observation that there are legitimate reasons other than race that the prosecutor may have had to excuse any one of the individuals that the prosecutor did excuse. [¶] So I find no prima facie case pattern of discriminatory exercise of peremptory challenges." The motion was denied. Counsel for appellant made no further effort to make a record to support the motion.

Ms. Kisha O., who is Black, was excused by the prosecution. Before she was excused, the trial court observed that she had been laughing inappropriately in the jury box during voir dire and inquired whether counsel would stipulate to excuse her. Defense counsel declined to stipulate, and shortly thereafter she was excused by the prosecution.

Mr. John B., who apparently is White, had prior experience on two drunk driving juries which did not reach verdicts. He said that he had voted for acquittal in one case because he believed the defendant more than the police officer who testified.

The prosecution's case was based largely on the testimony of Hewitt and Kaminsky, both of whom had been involved in illicit drugs. Darlene J., a Black prospective juror excused by the prosecutor, said that she would wonder about the credibility of a witness who either uses or sells drugs. She also had one daughter charged with prostitution and one charged with shoplifting.

Mr. Arthur S. was excused by the prosecutor. He had been a juror on a murder case in which the jury was unable to reach a verdict. He said that the deliberations in that case had left him stressed out and he found the experience very stressful. A nephew to whom he was very close had been arrested the previous year for robbery.

Mr. Robert T., a Black man, had no prior jury experience, and is a retired stock clerk. His daughter is employed at Martin Luther King Hospital. When asked about her work there, he responded: "Oh, I really couldn't tell. I know she works there. I don't know what."

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Ms. Wanda T., who is Black, was an unemployed artist, engaged to an unemployed man who was going back to school to study mechanics. She had no prior jury experience.

Mr. David C., a Black man, had prior jury experience, all criminal, and verdicts were reached in each case. He was a retired foreman with the Long Beach Naval Shipyard, and was married with a young son. His car had been stolen and no arrest had been made in the case. He is a hunter.

Mr. Edmond G., who is Hispanic, is a computer programmer with no jury experience. His uncle, with whom he is not close, is a retired detective for the Los Angeles Police Department. He engaged in a long colloquy with the prosecutor during which the prosecutor used a jigsaw puzzle which was missing a piece to discuss Mr. G.'s understanding of the reasonable doubt concept. The record does not sufficiently describe the puzzle to allow us to interpret Mr. G.'s answers.

The Supreme Court has held that a prima facie case of discriminatory use of peremptory challenges cannot be based solely on the fact that all challenged jurors were members of a particular race. (*People v. Turner* (1994) 8 Cal.4th 137, 167.) Instead "the trial judge, who had observed the voir dire, was in the best position to determine under 'all the relevant circumstances' of the case whether there was a "strong likelihood" these prospective jurors were being challenged 'because of their group association.' [Citation.]" (*Id.* at p. 168.)

The trial court may consider the fact that members of the group allegedly discriminated against are on the jury as an indication of good faith in exercising peremptories. (*Ibid.*) At the time that the *Wheeler* motion was made in this case, there were seven potential jurors who were Black in the jury box and two left in the venire. We do not find error in denial of the *Wheeler* motion.

C

Choice of Counsel

П

Appellant argues the trial court erred in refusing to appoint Wayne Brandow, who had represented him at the preliminary hearing, to represent him in the superior court. We find no error.

The superior court's refusal to continue the appointment of the attorney who had represented a defendant in municipal court is treated as a refusal to appoint counsel rather than a removal of counsel. (*Harris* v. Superior Court (1977) 19 Cal.3d 786, 799, fn. 12; *Alexander* v. Superior Court (1994) 22 Cal.App.4th 901, 914.) The decision whether to appoint a particular attorney is a matter within the sound discretion of the trial court. (22 Cal.App.4th at p. 915.)

Even in a capital case, the defendant does not have a right to appointment of a particular attorney. (*Drumgo* v. Superior Court (1973) 8 Cal.3d 930, 933-934.) The trial court is not compelled to continue the appointment of the requested attorney merely because the attorney is willing and available; because the defendant lacks confidence in, and refuses to cooperate with any other attorney; or because the defendant has trust and confidence in the requested attorney. (*Id.* at pp. 934-935.) Nevertheless, these factors should be taken into account by the court in exercising its discretion. (*Alexander* v. Superior Court, supra, 22 Cal.App.4th at pp. 915-916.)

The trial court must consider other factors as well. "In exercising its discretion, the trial court should take into account not only the foregoing subjective factors, but also objective factors such as previous representation of defendant by the requested attorney in the underlying or in any other proceeding, any extended relationship between defendant and the requested attorney, the familiarity of the requested attorney with the issues and witnesses in the case, the duplication of time and expense to the county of appointing an attorney other than the requested attorney and the timeliness of the request. [Citations.]" (Alexander v. Superior Court, supra, 22 Cal.App.4th at p. 916.)

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Appellant made the following statement in support of his motion to continue the representation of Mr. Brandow: "First, I feel very comfortable with Mr. Brandow being lead counsel. We've been together since the outset of this case. And to my knowledge, he's done a very good and thorough investigation of my case. He's believed in the things that I told him, certain facts for proving my innocence. And I believe that he really wants to help me, you know, in this case." Appellant also referred to the fact that Mr. Brandow had seen the scene where Mrs. Lee's body was dumped, which had been altered since that time. Appellant had nothing further to add.

Mr. Brandow said that he had prepared computer records cross-referencing tens of thousands of telephone calls. He explained: "An awful lot of the information on this case comes from connections in the telephone calls and where the calls are placed to the timing of the calls and timing when there were not calls, blank periods, absence of usage of a phone. So information along those lines I think relates overall to the entirety of the case. [¶]And it is not something that another attorney cannot become familiar with, but it requires the ability to cross-reference large amounts of data. So it would require some type of computer capability and going to require a lot of time before someone would be so familiar with it that a name would trigger something in their mind, would tell them that, yes, this is where I should be searching for information based upon that name." Mr. Brandow then submitted the matter.

At the May 1992 hearing on appointment of counsel, the court asked why it had taken so long for the case to get to the superior court following preliminary hearing since appellant had been arrested in April 1989, at which point Mr. Brandow had been appointed. Mr. Brandow explained that there had been problems in obtaining discovery from the prosecution.

The court asked Mr. Brandow to further explain the significance of the telephone records. He responded that the prosecution's theory of the case was based on Kaminsky's story that the killings were in retribution for "a drug rip-off," in which appellant and

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Hewitt had been victimized by Crockett. The defense theory, he said, was that the killings were instigated by Kaminsky because he had been victimized by Crockett.

In support of his version of the events, Kaminsky claimed that the telephone at his apartment was used on the afternoon of the murders by the victim to recover the drugs stolen from appellant and Hewitt. Mr. Brandow argued that his examination of the telephone records revealed, instead, that all but one call placed from Kaminsky's apartment during that time period, and received at that number, involved people with whom Kaminsky normally spoke. Mr. Brandow also contended that the telephone records showed that Kaminsky's telephone had been used to contact the owner of the Mercedes in which Crockett's body was found during the week prior to the murders and afterward. Mr. Brandow argued that his investigation had possible connections between Kaminsky and organized crime activities, including pornography, in Cleveland and the San Fernando Valley.

Joy Wilensky, who had been co-counsel with Mr. Brandow for two years, acknowledged that the case had become an Indigent Criminal Defense Attorney Case (ICDA), and that while she was an ICDA attorney at level 4 with one other capital case, Mr. Brandow was not. In her opinion, because of Mr. Brandow's work on the case in the municipal court, the trial court should appoint him to continue to represent appellant in the superior court.

John Hud, who had been appointed to represent appellant in the superior court, strongly supported Mr. Brandow and Ms. Wilensky continuing their representation of appellant based on the complexity of the case, and the extensive preparation and effort they had put into it. Appellant addressed the court, asking that Mr. Brandow be reappointed, because Mr. Brandow had represented him very well and thoroughly for three years, identifying additional witnesses and conducting effective cross-examination at the preliminary hearing.

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The trial court denied the motion, but granted a motion to make Mr. Brandow cocounsel on the case. The court stated that it would place a dollar limit on the amount allowed for second counsel.

Appellant argues the trial court abused its discretion because Mr. Brandow had engaged in years of extensive work on his complicated defense. He contends that the case is analogous to *Harris* v. *Superior Court, supra*, 19 Cal.3d 786. We do not agree.

In Harris, defendants Emily Harris and William Harris, alleged members of the Symbionese Liberation Army, were charged with multiple felonies. They asked the court to appoint Susan B. Jordan to represent Emily Harris and Leonard I. Weinglass to represent William Harris. The superior court refused to appoint the requested counsel and appointed other attorneys over objection by the defendants. Further hearings ensued, during which the defendants emphasized two factors in support of the continued representation by their requested counsel. First, they pointed out that Ms. Jordan and Mr. Weinglass had represented them in prior related criminal proceedings, all concerning the defendants' alleged activities as members of the Symbionese Liberation Army. It was anticipated that many of the issues and witnesses involved in the prior cases would also be involved in the present case. The defendants sought continuity in representation particularly because the prosecution had a special team which had been preparing for three years. They also said appointment of new counsel would entail duplicative time and expense to the county. (19 Cal.3d at p. 793.) The second factor urged by defendants was their subjective trust and confidence in their chosen counsel. (Id. at pp. 793-794.) After the trial court refused their motion, defendants sought and obtained review in the Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court concluded the trial court had abused its discretion and directed it to set aside its appointment of other counsel and to appoint Ms. Jordan and Mr. Weinglass. (*Harris* v. *Superior Court, supra*, 19 Cal.3d at p. 799.) In reaching that conclusion, the *Harris* court emphasized the extensive background Ms. Jordan and Mr.

Weinglass had accumulated during their representation of the defendants in related cases; and the fact that the appointed counsel vigorously supported defendants' motion for continued representation, in part because of their recognition that they would be required to expend considerable energy and time to become as familiar with the facts and issues as attorneys Jordan and Weinglass. (*Ibid.*)

Harris is distinguishable. Mr. Brandow had no relationship with appellant before representing him in this case. He was not a member of the ICDA panel. More importantly, the trial court approved his appointment as co-counsel for the defense, making his preparation and experience available to the defense at trial. There is no indication that the trial court refused to appoint Mr. Brandow as lead counsel because of some inflexible policy, and it offered appellant extensive opportunities to present his case for Mr. Brandow's continued appointment. (See *Alexander* v. *Superior Court, supra*, 22 Cal.App.4th at p. 919.) We find no abuse of discretion.

Ш

Evidentiary Issues

A. Kaminsky's Polygraph Examination

Appellant argues the trial court erred in precluding him from cross-examining Hewitt about his knowledge that Kaminsky had taken and failed a polygraph examination before Kaminsky received immunity for his role in these offenses. On appeal, he argues that this evidence was relevant to explain why Hewitt agreed to a plea bargain in this case. He asserts that the fact that Hewitt was impeached with other evidence, including evidence regarding the reasons Hewitt took the plea bargain, does not preclude the defense from inquiring into specific factors that influenced Hewitt's decision. Appellant argues: "In this case, the evidence that the defense sought to introduce was relevant to show Hewitt's state of mind in accepting the prosecution's case. This reflects both Hewitt's full motive to testify and his attitude towards the action."

At the beginning of Hewitt's direct examination, the prosecution elicited testimony regarding the plea bargain. Hewitt testified that he would get a 20-year sentence in exchange for his truthful testimony in this case. On cross-examination, Hewitt testified that he was arrested and prosecuted as a co-defendant in these offenses and that the prosecution was seeking the death penalty. From the preliminary hearing on, Hewitt sought a plea bargain to avoid the death penalty. After the appointment of a new death penalty committee in the district attorney's office, the prosecution no longer sought the death penalty. Hewitt was aware that he still faced a sentence of life imprisonment without possibility of parole, and sought a deal with the prosecution. He testified he believed he would serve less than the full 20-year term promised in the plea bargain because he would receive credit for time served, good time and work time.

Appellant's attorney elicited Hewitt's testimony that at one point prior to trial, the prosecutor and investigator said that they did not believe his statements, and that Hewitt thought that this jeopardized the plea bargain. Counsel for appellant asked: "And you know that if you were to say that James Harris was not involved in these killings or that you weren't involved in them then your deal with the District Attorney's Office would go out the window; is that correct?" Hewitt responded, "Correct."

Counsel for appellant also established that Hewitt originally had told the prosecution that he, appellant and Kaminsky had not discussed how the victims would be killed, and that the prosecution was not pleased with this account. At trial, Hewitt first testified on direct that he, appellant and Kaminsky had discussed what to do with the victims and had agreed that it was best to kill them. Later, on direct, Hewitt, changed his testimony and said there really was no discussion about killing the victims, but that he made the decision.

On cross-examination, Hewitt was asked whether there was any reason he was testifying for the prosecution besides the plea bargain. He answered: "Well, I had weighed everything out that was coming against me, you know, ... I didn't really have a

chance, you know. I seen that Jeffrey Kaminsky had four or five different fabricated stories. I seen he failed a polygraph test. I seen he was granted immunity by the original district attorney to testify against me, I seen that." The court struck the answer as nonresponsive and admonished the jury to disregard it. Hewitt went on to say that he agreed to testify because of the evidence against him, and the fact that Kaminsky had been given immunity. This testimony was not stricken.

Outside the presence of the jury, counsel for appellant argued the trial court should not have stricken Hewitt's testimony that his plea bargain was motivated in part because Kaminsky had taken and failed a polygraph test. He argued that he should be allowed to explore this because it went to Hewitt's reasons for testifying against appellant.

The prosecutor argued that any evidence regarding Kaminsky's polygraph test should be excluded under Evidence Code section 352 because its prejudicial value far outweighed whatever probative value it might have had. The prosecutor represented that Mr. Kaminsky had in fact passed the polygraph examination. Counsel for appellant replied that his expert had concluded that Kaminsky had lied in response to the key questions asked during the polygraph examination.

The trial court expressed doubt as to the probative value of a detailed examination of Hewitt regarding his assessment of the evidence against him and the fact that Kaminsky failed a polygraph examination. Counsel for appellant was allowed to examine Hewitt outside the presence of the jury on this point. Hewitt said that he was aware that a defense expert had concluded Kaminsky failed the examination; that the examiner had accused Kaminsky of lying during the examination; and that the murder book prepared by the police stated that Kaminsky had passed the examination.

Hewitt testified that this information scared him because the prosecution was still letting Kaminsky testify after giving him immunity, even though Kaminsky had failed the polygraph test. He said that if Kaminsky had not agreed to testify, that he would not have agreed to the plea bargain, and would have gone to trial. Answering questions by the

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court, Hewitt stated he had heard Kaminsky lie on the witness stand during the preliminary hearing, that he was affected by that testimony, and that he did not need the results of Kaminsky's polygraph examination to tell him that Kaminsky was lying about important things. The trial court ruled that evidence of the polygraph examination would be more prejudicial than probative, and that it would not be allowed.

In ruling on a motion to exclude evidence under Evidence Code section 352, "[T]he court need make no express statements on these issues so long as the record affirmatively shows that weighing occurred, and there is an adequate basis for appellate review. [Citations.]" (*People* v. *Arias* (1996) 13 Cal.4th 92, 155.) "Rulings under Evidence Code section 352 come within the trial court's discretion and will not be overturned absent an abuse of that discretion. [Citations.]" (*People* v. *Minifie* (1996) 13 Cal.4th 1055, 1070.)

Appellant was given ample opportunity to examine Hewitt's motivations for testifying, including the evidence against him, the possible sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole, and the fact that Kaminsky had been given immunity to testify against him. The results of Kaminsky's polygraph test were disputed. We find no abuse of discretion in the trial court's ruling.

B. Eyewitness Identification Expert

Appellant argues the trial court erred in not allowing him to present an expert to testify about the unreliability of eyewitness identification. The trial court asked appellant's counsel for an offer of proof why an eyewitness expert was necessary. The trial court observed that Kaminsky and Hewitt, both accomplices, had identified appellant and had known him well for some time prior to the murders. In addition, Karen Rose, who knew appellant, spent part of the afternoon of the murders at Kaminsky's apartment and identified appellant as one of those involved in holding the victims. Counsel for appellant argued that Ms. Rose's testimony was insufficient to corroborate that of the two accomplices because she was a friend of Kaminsky's. Appellant's counsel argued that

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the other witnesses, who had identified appellant as the person they saw in the red Hyundai the night of the murders, had made their identifications more than three years after the murders. He asserted that these witnesses had only a brief view of the man accompanying Hewitt and Kaminsky on the night of the murders, and that their later identification was therefore not credible.

The trial court pointed out that counsel for appellant had given very good reasons why a reasonable person might disbelieve the testimony of the tow truck driver who had driven the three accomplices back to Los Angeles. These arguments, the trial court said, should be made to the jury. Counsel for appellant said that Dr. Frazer would testify about the suggestiveness of in-court identifications and problems with memory in eyewitness identification. The prosecutor responded that there was ample evidence to corroborate the testimony of Kaminsky and Hewitt that appellant was involved in the offenses.

The trial court agreed, observing that Karen Rose was not an accomplice, and that the other witnesses corroborated each other. Based on that evidence, under Evidence Code section 352, the trial court excluded the testimony of Dr. Frazer.

We find no error, given the corroborating evidence presented. Even if the exclusion of the eyewitness expert was error, it was harmless in light of appellant's opportunity to impeach the witnesses' testimony. (See *People* v. *Watson* (1956) 46 Cal.2d 818, 834.)

C. Admission of Kaminsky's and Hewitt's Testimony

Appellant argues that the testimony of codefendants, who have entered into agreements with the prosecution resulting in either immunity or a reduced sentence, is admissible only if the codefendants are required to testify truthfully, rather than to testify in a particular way. He asserts that the prosecutor, in closing argument, acknowledged that Kaminsky and Hewitt had given different accounts, with Kaminsky trying to minimize his personal involvement and Hewitt placing more blame on Kaminsky.

The prosecutor began his closing argument with the following: "The first question is; [*sic*] is Jeff Kaminsky's version of the facts correct or is there still things that he is unwilling to admit? [¶] Is Eddie Hewitt's version of the facts correct or is he still attempting to placate his cousin by placing as much blame on Jeff Kaminsky as he possibly can? [¶] And in all probability, the answer to that question lies somewhere in the middle. But for your purposes as jurors in this trial, it really doesn't matter because both Jeff Kaminsky and Eddie Hewitt, even though they are slanting it the way they want you to hear it, place the defendant as a principal in this case."

"Due process is denied when a prosecutor knowingly uses perjured testimony to obtain a conviction. [Citations.]" (*People* v. *Marshall* (1996) 13 Cal.4th 799, 829-830.) "Under the current rule, a showing that the false testimony was perjurious, or that the prosecution knew of its falsity, is no longer necessary. [Citations.]" (*Id.* at p. 830.)

We first observe that appellant has forfeited the right to raise this issue on appeal since he failed to raise it before the trial court. (See *People v. Marshall, supra*, 13 Cal.4th 830, 831.) Even if the issue were properly before us, we would find that it lacked merit.

It was not established that codefendants were required by their bargains to testify in a particular way, truthful or not. Moreover, the jury was fully aware that Kaminsky and Hewitt gave inconsistent testimony, and was able to assess their credibility. On this record, we find no due process violation.

IV

Identity of Informant

In a supplemental brief, appellant argues the prosecution should have made a more timely disclosure of the identify of a confidential informant. The Attorney General responds that the informant was described by the prosecution as a person who had been incarcerated with Hewitt 8 to 10 months prior to the murders. The informant told the police that Hewitt was often visited by a woman driving an imported red car. When the prosecutor told the defense that the informant would not be called as a witness, the

defense dropped its efforts to obtain disclosure of his identity while the case was still in the municipal court. The defense renewed the motion in the superior court, and eventually the prosecutor disclosed the informant's identity and the fact that he had committed suicide.

Appellant has failed to meet his burden of demonstrating that the confidential informant whose identity he sought could have given evidence exonerating him. (*People* v. *Gordon* (1990) 50 Cal.3d 1223, 1246.) The only information given by this informant was to link Hewitt with a woman who drove a red, imported car. There is no showing how this information was material to appellant's defense. We find no basis for reversal.

DISPOSITION

The judgment is affirmed.



Mijares, Senior Hearing Officer (SHO), for the purpose of adjudicating this Rules Violation Report. HARRIS stated he was in good health and ready to proceed with this hearing.

DOCUMENT ISSUANCE: HARRIS acknowledged that he had received copies of the following documents at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to this hearing:

These reports were reviewed with HARRIS in the hearing. HARRIS is charged with Possession of Dangerous Property (i.e., Cellular Telephone, Cellular Phone Charger), a Division 'D' Offense. HARRIS was advised that the charged offense is a violation of CCR §3006 Contraband, subparagraph (a), Dangerous Property. CCR §3006(a) states, "Inmates may not possess or have under their control or constructive possession any weapons, explosives, explosive making material, poisons or any destructive devices, nor shall they possess or assist in circulating any writing or voice recording which describes the making of any weapons, explosives, poisons, destructive devices, or cellular telephones or wireless communication devices or any component thereof including, but not limited to, a subscriber identity module (SIM card) or memory storage devices and cellular telephone chargers." HARRIS acknowledged understanding the charge and the evidence being presented.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY: This matter has not been referred for criminal prosecution.

TIME CONSTRAINTS: HARRIS received a copy of the CDC-115 within 15 days of discovery of the charged offense (CCR 3320(a)). This hearing is being held within 30 days from the date HARRIS received a copy of the CDC-115 (CCR 3320(b)). There has been no time constraint violation that would preclude assessment of credit forfeiture for a guilty finding.

CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION: There was no confidential information to be considered.

PHOTOGRAPH/VIDEOTAPE EVIDENCE: There were no photographs or videotapes presented as evidence at this hearing.

MENTAL HEALTH INFORMATION: HARRIS is not a participant in the Mental Health Services Delivery System (MHSDS) and his observed behavior at the time of the rules violation was not reported to have been bizarre, unusual, or uncharacteristic. Therefore, a Mental Health Assessment was not required.

EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION: Effective communication means providing the inmate, to the extent possible, the means to understand and participate in the disciplinary process to the best of their ability. If the inmate's Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) score is 4.0 or lower, employees are required to query the inmate to determine whether or not assistance is needed to achieve effective communication. HARRIS has a documented TABE score of 12.9. Further, HARRIS does not demonstrate the need for any type of auxiliary communication aids, sign language interpreter or bilingual interpreter. HARRIS demonstrated to the SHO his ability to read and he explained his understanding of the charges against him to the satisfaction of the SHO. The SHO is satisfied that HARRIS has no disabilities or issues that require the use of Equally Effective Communication Tools and that effective communication was achieved with HARRIS throughout the disciplinary process.

STAFF ASSISTANT: A Staff Assistant (SA) was not assigned because HARRIS does not meet the assignment criteria per CCR 3315(d)(2). HARRIS appears to be literate, understands English, does not require a confidential relationship, and can present his own defense without assistance. HARRIS has no mental health factors that require the assignment of a Staff Assistant.

INVESTIGATIVE EMPLOYEE: An Investigative Employee (IE) was not assigned. The Classifying Official evaluated the need for an IE and determined one would not be required. The issues are not complex, HARRIS can complete his own investigation, and available information is sufficient. HARRIS does not meet the assignment criteria per CCR 3315(d)(1).

PLEA AND STATEMENT: HARRIS entered a plea of Guilty and stated, "It was my cellphone my cellie PORTER did not know anything about it."

WITNESSES: Neither HARRIS nor the SHO called witnesses at the hearing. HARRIS was given an opportunity to request witnesses when he received a copy of the CDC-115A and at the hearing when the SHO advised HARRIS of his right to request witnesses.

FINDING: Guilty of the Division 'D' Offense POSSESSION OF DANGEROUS CONTRABAND AS IDENTIFIED IN SECTION 3000 (§3323(f)(15)). POSSESSION means having actual physical custody or control of an object. CONSTRUCTIVE possession exists where a person has knowledge of an object plus the ability to control the object, even if the person has no physical contact with it. Because each inmate has an assigned area of responsibility, anything found within that area is generally considered to be in his constructive possession. Possession may be SOLE or JOINT. If one person alone has actual or constructive possession of an item, then possession is sole. If more than one person has actual or constructive possession of an item then possession is joint. If the item was discovered in an area that is shared with another inmate (Common area of a cell) then both inmates are generally responsible, given that there is reasonable evidence presented to prove that both inmates were aware of its presence. DANGEROUS CONTRABAND means materials or substances that could be used to facilitate a crime or could be used to aid an escape or that have been altered from their original manufactured state or purpose and which could be fashioned in to a weapon. Exampled would include, but not be limited to, metal, plastic, wood, or wire. Also included are sharpened objects such as scissors or other tools not authorized to be in the inmate's possession, as well as poison, caustic substances, flame producing devices (i.e. matches or lighters) or cellular telephones or wireless communication devices or any components thereof, including, but not limited to, a subscriber identity module (SIM card), memory storage device, cellular phone charger. This finding is based upon a preponderance of the following evidence:

- 1) The Reporting Employee's Report (CDC-115) authored by Correctional Officer T. Forsberg, which states in part, on Tuesday, November 18, 2014, at approximately 1135 hours, while assigned to A5 Floor #1, I was conducting searches of FAB3 cell 212, occupied by Inmates HARRIS (J46320, FAB3-212U) and PORTER (H26312, FAB3-212L.) During the course of the search I...discovered a black Samsung cellular phone and charger inside a false bottom. I maintained possession of the cellular phone and then interviewed Inmate HARRIS about the phone found in his cell, at which point he admitted the cell phone and charger is his and not his cellie's. I provided HARRIS with a CDC1040 Cell Search Receipt of items confiscated. I then proceeded to Facility 'A' Program Sergeant D. Jemison to inform him of my findings. I then reported to the Facility A/B Sub Evidence Room and placed the cell phone and charger in locker #23.
- 2) Guilty plea entered by HARRIS and his statement provided at the hearing stating, "It was my cell-phone my cellie PORTER did not know anything about it."
- 3) There was no evidence presented to refute the written reports submitted at the hearing.
