An open letter to California law enforcement officials:

A coalition of 21 press rights and civil liberties organizations today call on California law enforcement agencies, officers, and their partners to obey the California law permitting the press to enter closed areas devastated by the greater Los Angeles wildfires. The press has the unique responsibility of informing the public about these fires, especially when entire neighborhoods continue to be closed to the public.

We understand and empathize with the difficult task firefighters and first responders are facing, and deeply appreciate their service. But we write because we have concerns about recent treatment of journalists who are covering the devastation with professionalism and compassion. We have learned of troubling instances where journalists have been illegally turned away from checkpoints and faced intimidation tactics and other interference with their newsgathering. These issues have occurred at numerous locations, across several days and involve multiple local and state agencies. Journalists must be allowed to do their jobs while first responders do theirs.

To assist law enforcement agencies and other first responders, we share these reminders and recommendations:

- The same California law that gives law enforcement the ability to close areas during
  emergencies explicitly exempts the press. "This section shall not prevent a duly
  authorized representative of a news service, newspaper, or radio or television station or
  network from entering the areas closed pursuant to this section." <u>California Penal Code</u>
  section 409.5(d)(1).
- A government-issued "press credential" is not a requirement to show eligibility for press
  access to closed areas. Agencies must not turn away journalists who present other
  evidence demonstrating their eligibility for this exception through a variety of indicators,
  such as press identification issued by newsrooms, press clubs or journalism
  organizations, business cards, or letters from assignment desks. If there is any doubt
  about a reporter's identity, it can also be verified by looking at common forms of
  identification and searching online for their name and media organization.
- It is especially critical that agencies do not require a government-issued press credential
  to permit access, given that journalists from all over the country who would not have a
  local agency-issued press credential are an essential part of the journalism
  community covering this disaster.
- We urge all responding law enforcement agencies, along with the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection

and CalGuard, to issue recurring directives to relevant personnel about following Penal Code section 409.5's media access provisions.

We note that Cal Fire has embraced the role of the press covering wildfires. When Americans see the infernos, they take the threats more seriously and are more likely to evacuate and otherwise take precautions, Daniel Berlant, formerly a top Cal Fire official and current California Fire Marshal, told the Associated Press.
