DIRECTOR HENRY FIERRO Good morning, Council President, Councilmembers. First of all, can you hear me okay? Perfect. Henry Fierro budget director. Today begins the FY 24 budget review hearings. I will be providing a general fund overview. Then we'll proceed with departmental presentations.

Before I start though, the general 8 9 overview, there are a couple of items I just want to walk through as far as procedures. So the 10 11 format for the reviews will be the same as we had conducted last year. And just real quickly some 12 13 bullet points that I'd like to share. The department directors will present an overview of 14 15 their department's budget. If Council has any 16 specific questions concerning the department's budget operations, et cetera, the department 17 director and staff will be here to answer those 18 questions. 19

20 PRESIDENT TYLER MAXWELL: I appreciate 21 that. And I'm going to ask my colleagues too 22 that we allow each department director to get 23 through their presentation before we begin 24 questions and comments.

25

DIRECTOR HENRY FIERRO Perfect. Thank

1 Next is if a Councilmember wishes to make a you. motion to change the budget, they can do so at 2 any time during the budget hearing. However, a 3 motion must get a second to be recorded by my 4 5 staff and the City Clerk to be on the motion As provided in previous hearings, formal 6 list. submission of the motion via email would greatly 7 help us to make sure we're capturing the specific 8 9 verbiage that's being created for the motion. So I highly ask that if we could do that. 10

And the goal for us is to then publish the motion and direction list the same day of these hearings. So as soon as you can provide us that email, we'll get that incorporated so we can then hopefully distribute it ASAP, at the end of the day.

Also Councilmembers can make a request for information at the dais. Again, I'm asking if we can get that in writing as well via email, so we can make sure we're getting the verbiage as accurately as possible. And then also we will distribute again motions and directions at the end of the day.

And then with that Council motions are scheduled to be voted on Wednesday, June 14th.

5 One thing I want to point out though is as observed in prior years, if the approved 6 costing creates a deficit in the general fund, 7 then Council's Budget Subcommittee with the 8 Administration will then need to meet, work 9 through a budget worksheet reconciliation so then 10 11 we can then realign the general fund budget back 12 in balance and then a follow-up motion will be 13 needed to then be approved so we can then balance the budget and then allow my staff and I then to 14 15 create the enabling documents of the balanced 16 budget. And that will be voted on Thursday, June 17 22nd.

And then finally on Thursday, June 29th, it is reserved, if needed, for a final budget vote.

And then the last item, it's a housekeeping item. And that is to note we begin is to formally report per the Transparency Act the listings of elected officials and employee earnings, consultant disclosure, and benchmark

city data are on the city's website under the
 personnel departments section.

So with that, now I'm going to move 3 over to the general fund overview. So the flow 4 5 of this overview is I'm going to start off with budgeted revenue specifically for the general 6 7 fund. We'll cover the main categories. We'll also go into each category in a little more in 8 9 depth discussion. Once we go through the revenues, then we'll look at and share the 10 11 general fund expenditures by department.

12 So let me see here. Okay. So Slide 2. 13 It's an illustration of our FY 24 proposed budgeted, again, general fund revenues totaling 14 15 481.7 million. And as you can see on this pie 16 chart, the largest contributor to our general 17 fund revenues is our property tax at 174.1 million or 30 per -- 36.1 percent of our various 18 19 revenue categories.

The second major category then is our sales tax, which is 153.6 million or roughly 32 percent of our total revenue sources. I'm going to slide -- move to the next slide which will give us a little historical trend.

25

And again, it's the same categories.

1 It starts off with prior year carryover. And then below that, you're going to see then what we 2 call our ongoing revenue sources, starting with 3 sales tax, property tax, then business license, 4 5 room tax, so on and so forth. Historically, we have been growing, as you can see from '22 to 6 7 '21, overall, we grew almost 13.5 percent. And then from '22 to '23 we look to grow by 5.4 8 9 percent. And then from '23 estimate to '24 proposed, we're actually dipping, reduced or 10 11 declining by 3.1 percent. And I'll explain that 12 decline in a second here. So I'd like to then 13 move on and then start discussing the individual revenue categories. 14

15 Oh, if I may point out, too, if you 16 look at the sales tax line, you'll see that the 17 annual change is 1.9 percent growth. What you have to keep in mind is in the sales tax 18 category, we have economic incentives that we are 19 20 also budgeting for payouts. So if you exclude the economic incentives, the sales tax is 21 22 actually growing at 2.5 percent. But once we 23 incorporate those payments, then it brings it 24 down to 1.9.

25

This next slide actually is a further

1	breakdown of all other revenue. And you'll see
2	that it's encompassing our franchise fees. We
3	have what's called intergovernmental. Along with
4	that is in intragovernmental, along with
5	cannabis, Prop 172, real estate transfer tax,
6	card room. And so the goal was to look at where
7	we're headed through FY '23 based on those
8	trends, carry that over into to '24.
9	Now, if you look at cannabis, you'll
10	see how it's from 1,168,900 in FY '23 while it's
11	now growing to 5,381,400. The growth behind that
12	is our estimates are based on two facilities.
13	However, in '24, we're projecting that it will go
14	from 2 to 11. So that's what's driving that
15	revenue growth.
16	You'll also see card room. I wanted to
17	point that one out as well as we're anticipating
18	to land at just over a million dollars in FY '23.
19	And again, that is based on what's actually come
20	in the door with just a little bit of time left
21	to complete the year or should be just about
22	breaking a million. And having said that, I'm
23	using that same trend in carrying that over into
24	'24. So I think we're in a good spot to, to hit
25	that million dollar mark.

1 And then in all other, it's a, it's just a compilation of various activities that, 2 for example, within that million seven, we have 3 what's called a portfolio fee and what that is, 4 5 that's worth half a million of that 1.7 million. And that is, we have a treasury unit that 6 7 oversees the City's cash. And so in essence, for their services, they're receiving half a million 8 9 of the interest generated.

And along with that, we've got some 10 11 other minor categories like, for example, there's 12 about 300,000 for blight removal, another 200,000 13 for fencing of properties. And along with that, there's probably another couple hundred thousand 14 15 at the regional -- sorry, it's the parks facility 16 and I'm trying to -- bear with me Council. It's 17 their sports center. Thank you. There, there is metering for a solid waste adjacent facility. So 18 parks actually pays that metering cost on behalf 19 20 of DPU, but DPU provides them a reimbursement 21 through this revenue. So with all of that, I 22 mean, again, it's 1.7 million. And in comparison 23 to the total city revenue, it's under 1 percent. So while it's 100 million, still relatively, it's 24 25 somewhat small compared to the bigger categories.

1 Now, this next slide is the sales tax and what I wanted to show is some historical 2 trend of the, if you will, you'll see primarily a 3 growth starting from 2015 to the budget of 2024. 4 5 But I also wanted to show how, with actuals, what the relative budget was for each given fiscal 6 7 year. So you can kind of have a comparison of what did we budget and how did we end up the 8 9 fiscal year. For the most part, we pretty much 10 were either just above or at. As you move 11 forward in time, you'll see that in FY '23, we 12 are utilizing MuniServices guidance. However, 13 we're also seeking to, to bump it up just a little more. We're trying to access as much 14 15 sales tax as we believe we can receive. 16 Muni has -- provides us multiple 17 scenarios and they allow us to say here we think is somewhat most likely. Here is what we think 18 is optimistic. And we're kind of just above the 19 20 most likely, but we're not at the optimistic. So 21 we're really trying to access as much sales tax 22 in our projections. 23 And with that, just a little In their analysis, they do provide 24 background. 25 us some statistics like of our sales tax, we have

1 31 business segments which nearly account for 61 percent of the total sales tax. And within that, 2 you'll see the breakdown by major business 3 category. Retail is almost 27 percent. 4 5 Department stores, restaurants are about 10 And then new auto sales will bring in 6 percent. 7 about 8 percent followed up by building materials at 6 percent. 8

The '24 projection does reflect what we 9 anticipate of a further slowing in growth. 10 We're still growing but not growing as fast as we have 11 12 observed in the prior years. And again, that has 13 a correlation to the current environment of the inflationary impacts to our consumer spending 14 15 along with the growth in our borrowing costs in 16 the environment. So we're trying to keep that in 17 mind as we're building a '24 sales tax projection. Just one moment, Councilmembers. 18

ASSISTANT CITY MANAGER RUTHIE QUINTO: Good, good morning. Thank you. Thank you, TJ. I want -- this is Ruthie and I wanted to just make sure to provide a little bit more context regarding the current year sales tax estimates, The estimates for FY '23. I remind the Council that we did have a longer discussion about this

1 during the midyear budget and noted that we are pulling back for the current year estimates off 2 of what MuniServices had originally projected for 3 the year in their most likely scenario. We are 4 5 mainly going on and continue to go on the receipts that we have actually collected at this 6 time. And that's the main reason for the 7 guidance to be under that blue line that you see 8 9 there for the current year.

In addition, we are then utilizing 10 11 that as our base for growth for next year. So it 12 is different from the MuniServices report. It's 13 a little more optimistic than what they are recommending at this time. But it's such a wide 14 15 swing from year over year over the past several 16 years in particular, we thought it would be 17 better to go with what we know and base next year's projection on what we've actually 18 received, even though it's a little higher, about 19 1.5 million higher than what they're recommending 20 21 at this time for the current year. Additionally, for next year, they did 22

Additionally, for next year, they did not recommend 2.5 percent growth. They recommended something less, almost 1 percent, I believe 0.8 percent. And rather than take that

1 again down, again, a wild -- not wild but a more significant swing, we are smoothing out the five-2 year projection. And so in the budget book under 3 the general fund summary, you can see that we do 4 5 have five-year projections. And that fifth year of the sales tax number is the MuniServices most 6 likely scenario. And so just getting from the 7 current year, or the budget year, pardon me, to 8 9 that point is more of a smoothed out line rather than to have more significant changes year over 10 11 year from here to there. So hopefully, that's 12 helpful and gives you a little bit of an idea of 13 how we didn't take exactly what they said verbatim, but instead used a little bit more of 14 15 an analysis and other things into consideration 16 as we were making those projections. Thank you. 17 DIRECTOR HENRY FIERRO Council, I'm going to move to the next slide and that is 18 similar to sales tax, it is now property tax 19 20 showing you, again, some historical trend going 21 back from 2015 to the 2024 proposed budget. And 22 again, if you look at the visual here, you are 23 seeing how we are growing. We are growing year 24 to year. With that in '24 we are projecting a 25 4.2 percent growth over the '23 estimate. The

1 '23 estimate is -- it was built based on the 2 latest assessed values that was published in July 3 of '22 from the assessor's office. So again, 4 Assessor's office established our '23 estimate. 5 From there, we built in a 4.2 percent in '24.

What this slide represents is the 6 7 business tax and room tax. But what I wanted to show here is the relationship of these two 8 9 revenue categories in comparison to the sales tax because there is this natural correlation that 10 11 takes place and the movement of sales tax pretty 12 much you can then see the same movement with 13 these two categories. So there is growth within those two. And, again, we want to peg it to how 14 15 we believe sales tax will move going forward. Ιt 16 just seems like it's measuring pretty well 17 historically. We want to apply it in the future.

18 And this slide is just a table to show a little bit of the history and the relationship 19 again of business tax and room tax in relation to 20 21 The one thing I do want to point out sales tax. 22 with the room tax is in FY '24 we did program an 23 additional million dollars and that is in 24 correlation to the recent transit occupation tax 25 and it was amended per the Code Section 7-602.

Now moving from revenues to now department appropriation specifically for the FY '24 proposed budget, in total you'll see then it adds up to 457.3 million. Through this visual, you'll see that public safety is our primary use of the source, and then further broken down by the various departments.

In line with the pie chart, this next 8 9 table then shows by department and then some historical actuals, where we estimate the 10 11 departments to land, and then what we're 12 budgeting again in '24. Overall, there is a 13 growth of about 2.4 percent. The appropriations, they do include that we fully funded, if you 14 15 will, we accounted for any MOUs. So we built 16 those in the budget accordingly by the bargain 17 units/departments.

One thing also I want to point out, 18 Council, is under general city purpose, you'll 19 see how that number is actually a negative 20 21 The reason for that is we also accounted number. 22 for our attrition rate. Historically, it's been 23 running between 10 and 13. We built an attrition rate in the budget at 10 percent. So with that, 24 25 that equated to about a 32.1 million attrition

1 savings, the reason being that's why the general city purpose then shows that negative 20.6. 2 Council, that concludes the general 3 fund overview presentation. I will stop there 4 5 and if there's any questions. PRESIDENT TYLER MAXWELL: I appreciate 6 7 Thank you for the presentation. We do have it. some folks queued up at this time starting with 8 Councilmember Karbassi. 9 COUNCILMEMBER MIKE KARBASSI: All 10 11 right, first up. Thank you so much. First off, 12 I want to thank the Mayor. I know you gave us a 13 little bit of an earlier budget this year. This made a big difference and I do -- it's a double 14 15 edged sword. But I tell you what, as a member of 16 the budget committee, I do appreciate that. And thank you to staff. You guys have been working 17 this a long time. So here we go. Okay. A 18 couple of questions. So I'm always concerned and 19 20 nervous about revenue. That's just the way I was 21 raised growing up in a small business. Some 22 months you don't have money and you got to save. 23 Now, thankfully, we have good reserves. But talking about our sales tax, sales tax revenue, 24 25 can you tell me a little bit more about how we

1 arrived at that number? Because I just want to make sure we're on target. I worry coming back 2 and maybe you're saying, oh, we weren't -- I know 3 you touched on that, Ruthie, a moment ago. We're 4 5 not quite there and we have to go back and account for that. Because what I'm reading is 6 7 more people are moving towards services now, which aren't taxed. So how confident are we in 8 9 our numbers when it comes to that? You said it was only about a million dollars off than the 10 11 more conservative Muni estimate? 12 ASSISTANT CITY MANAGER RUTHIE QUINTO: 13 Can you hear me now? Oh, it takes a second. It's up. There we go. Thank you. 14 Okay. I'11 15 get used to this technology. So, yes. So the 16 more conservative projection for the current year 17 would be about 1.5 million off of the gross amount. But again, that incorporates future 18 losses or amounts in the future that are actually 19 less than what, what we believe that we will 20 21 collect. So as every month goes by, we get a little closer to the estimate and feel even more 22 23 confident that we'll get to that number for FY 24 23. 25 COUNCILMEMBER MIKE KARBASSI: And we

1	constantly track that to make sure we're on
2	target.
3	ASSISTANT CITY MANAGER RUTHIE QUINTO:
4	Every month.
5	COUNCILMEMBER MIKE KARBASSI: Will that
6	be something, maybe quarterly, that we share with
7	the Budget Committee? I don't know if it's been
8	done before, but that might be helpful because we
9	can just be aware of what's to come.

And I have heard -- and I don't want to 9 10 put anyone on the spot, but I've heard things 11 like "This is the most important thing we can do 12 for our city. This is the most important thing 13 we can do besides public safety for our city, for the retired citizens of Fresno." I've heard it 14 15 many times. The Senior Task Force completed six 16 months of work and came forward with a white paper. And then, our Parks Department spent 17 months and months coming up with a business plan. 18 City Council and administration, we are ready. 19 We are ready to deliver on the promises each one 20 21 of us have made to our seniors.

So, is this now -- is this an opportunity for us to say, "You know what, we'll take our District hats off. Yeah, we all need tree trim. Yeah, we all need paving. Yeah, we

" -- and deliver on something that we've paid so much -- myself included, we've all 2 paid so much lip service to our senior citizens 3 community in this city and we're so close. So, 4 5 if we can't compromise; the fire station is not the direction this Council wants to go in, could 6 7 a senior citizen's center be the direction that the Council wants to go in? And I would hope the 8 9 answer would be yes.

So, I quess my question for the maker 10 11 of the motion: would you be interested in the 12 3.5 million -- or 2.5 million funds a senior 13 center, I think Parvin was talking, and Sean, for five years. Would the maker of the motion -- and 14 15 I think he could probably get a 7-0 vote right 16 now to deliver on the promises that we've been making to our seniors. So, would the maker of 17 the motion be willing -- and I think he'd get a 18 7-0 vote by taking that second part of money out 19 20 of what it says on this piece of paper -- to put 21 money into infrastructure funds and fund a senior 22 center in Fresno for five years? That would be 23 my request, and we would -- I promise we'd get a 7-0 vote on that. 24

COUNCILMEMBER LUIS CHAVEZ: Well, then,

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25

maybe you can make a motion on that, but I'd like
 a vote on my motion first.

3 PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Thank you.4 Councilmember Caprioglio?

COUNCILMEMBER PAUL CAPRIOGLIO: Just 5 clarification -- my offer was to complete the 6 community center in District 4. As we all know, 7 and I've said it a thousand times, that I don't 8 have one. So, I would urge you to join forces 9 with District 4 and make a Clint Olivier Senior 10 11 Center room or building or annex to a community 12 center in District 4. I'd have to have that 13 before I could support a motion that you're suggesting, because I've never promised that in 14 15 and of itself as a standalone building.

16 Nothing against seniors, but I have to take care of my children, people of all ages in 17 District 4 before I can isolate and do a 18 standalone for seniors, so that's just what I 19 20 want you to understand, and I appreciate what 21 you're doing for seniors on this dais. My mom's 22 91 years old. She'd love to get a senior hot 23 meal or hang out at the senior center, but I have to get that community center first, which those 24 25 people can still enjoy and come and participate

once we get it done in District 4, so just for
 clarification. Just wanted to let you know how I
 feel about that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Thank you.
Councilmember Bredefeld.

COUNCILMEMBER GARRY BREDEFELD: Yeah. 6 7 Again, I asked about the committee. I think I'm not going to support this because I'm not sure 8 9 this is the best way we should be doing this. I frankly like the idea of using the \$3.5 million 10 11 for the fire station. I think it ought to be 12 something that benefits the entire city and 13 obviously, public safety is our number one priority and we need that fire station. And in 14 15 order for the growth area to take place -- and we 16 need the growth -- we've got to have the fire station there as well. That's incumbent upon 17 18 that to happen.

I think when we start getting down to breaking down this into seven pots, I think we're going to run into trouble. I think we already have almost \$200,000 that we're going to be able to utilize. There's other monies that aren't being spent that we need to spend for our citizens, so I think we're moving in the wrong

1	direction. That's why I won't support it. And I
2	implore the Council, let's get the fire station
3	that we all know needs to happen.
4	PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA:
5	Councilmember Olivier.
6	COUNCILMEMBER CLINTON OLIVIER: I guess
7	my final I would ask Council and even the
8	maker of the motion as well I would ask for a
9	no vote, and I would ask that we reset after this
10	vote and that we move forward. If I mean, the
11	seniors aren't here today. If the seniors were
12	here today, I think we'd have a different result,
13	but they're not here today, and I wish they were
14	because I think it'd be great to have, you know,
15	75, 80 of them with waving signs and demanding
16	that we act. They're the ones that have been
17	paying taxes and working and doing so much for
18	our city for decades and decades.
19	And all due respect, Councilmember
20	Caprioglio, you are a fantastic advocate for a
21	community center in your District. You are doing
22	very, very good work. You don't stop; you're a
23	great advocate for that. But I don't see 85, 100
24	people in here waving signs and demanding a
25	community center in District 4. The seniors

1 if we -- if you and I have to compromise and we put the senior center in your District, I say 2 let's do that, but the seniors come here 3 regularly. And yes, thank you, we all voted 4 5 \$100,000 for the seniors, but it's not -- Council colleagues, I'm a little disheartened because the 6 7 mood and the words that we're all choosing as we address the issue of a senior center are 8 9 different today than they were when this gallery was full of seniors. 10

11 And so, my request of you is -- and 12 even to the maker of this motion -- I have not 13 seen this gallery full of people demanding that we put hundreds of thousands of dollars in our 14 15 infrastructure funds, but I have seen this 16 gallery full of senior citizens demanding that we 17 address their needs. Councilmember Olivier, I just want to remind you 1 that the day that the seniors were here, you 2 didn't say anything about making a motion about 3 this. What's the difference? 6 7 COUNCILMEMBER CLINTON OLIVIER: The difference is that \$100,000 does not even begin 8 9 to address their needs. So, you can grandstand 10 and you can talk about how you came --11 COUNCILMEMBER LUIS CHAVEZ: I'm not 12 grandstanding. 13 COUNCILMEMBER CLINTON OLIVIER: No, you put me down and you're grandstanding over 14 15 \$100,000. 16 COUNCILMEMBER LUIS CHAVEZ: I actually 17 have the guts to do something. 18 MAN 3: I call for the question. 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1 PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Councilmember Caprioglio, thank you for that. 2 I'd be supportive of that motion. I also wanted 3 to include -- if you would allow me to amend your 4 5 motion, to include part of the HERO Team contractual line item. I'd like to -- there are 6 7 some other park needs that we have that are -we've been working with our Parks Department and 8 9 kind of tiering them out, and so wanted to see if we could use those also as potential. So, since 10 11 those other two funding sources are going to 12 PARCS, would like to include the \$420,000 for 13 additional needs in the parks -- one-time needs that we have. 14 15 COUNCILMEMBER PAUL CAPRIOGLIO: You 16 know, I'd be happy -- I have that list in my hand here and unfortunately, we don't have enough 17 funding for all that without adjusting this great 18 opportunity with new money, but I'd be happy to 19 amend the motion to include that. 20 21 PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Perfect. VICE PRESIDENT STEVE BRANDAU: Council 22 23 President, I was the second. Could you clarify what you want to do with the HERO Team? What are 24 25 you saying?
1 PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Using the allocation, the 420,000, to address some of the 2 one-time needs that we have in our existing 3 neighborhood parks. We have a laundry list of 4 5 needs that have been presented to the subcommittee that had been working on this issue, 6 7 and so there's a gap and I think this would help do a little bit of a dent on that gap. 8

9 CITY MANAGER WILMA QUAN-SCHECTER: So, I'd like to address that needs funding, if I may. 10 11 So, that is a contractual obligation that should 12 have been included in the current budget, but it 13 was not, and so there is an existing agreement. It's money that we are obligated to pay, and so 14 15 this is kind of a cleanup item, if you will. And 16 I know that we have been working with the budget 17 subcommittee, but there was a million dollars that you all made a motion for and approved with 18 this current budget for just those PARCS needs 19 that Council President mentioned and we still are 20 21 waiting on that list from Council to move forward 22 with those. So, our recommendation would be to 23 pay off the contractual obligation we have for the \$420,000. 24

PRESIDENT ESMERALDA SORIA: Can the

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City Attorney weigh in on this issue? Because I
 know that there were some questions raised prior
 to the meeting regarding the contractual
 obligation that is being explained to us.
 CITY ATTORNEY DOUGLAS SLOAN: Right.

Concerning the HERO contract, we were looking --6 7 we could not find a current contract payment obligation. We found that there is an agreement 8 that has been extended from time to time, but not 9 10 a current obligation to make a payment. Plus, agreements -- and we need to check -- typically 11 12 have a non-appropriation provision, so if the 13 Council fails to appropriate, then the contract terminates anyway. So, we've not been able to 14 15 locate a current contract obligation.

16 CITY MANAGER WILMA QUAN-SCHECTER: So, 17 City Attorney, I show that we have a fourth 18 amendment that goes until June 30th, 2019. Are 19 you seeing that on your end as well?

20 CITY ATTORNEY DOUGLAS SLOAN: Was that 21 approved by Council?

22 CITY MANAGER WILMA QUAN-SCHECTER: I 23 just have some notes in front of me. I don't --24 CITY ATTORNEY DOUGLAS SLOAN: Let us 25 check further.

I have updated the attached motion list with feedback some of you have provided me. However, I'm resending the file that now is updated w/ the final 94 motions established, voted, and approved today. I now need to provide the Administration the costing of all these motions by **Monday the 27**th. I have to meet this deadline in order for the Administration to begin discussions with the Council's Budget subcommittee the following day to work towards balancing the budget, specifically the General Fund. My team then will need to turn around, ASAP, and update the budget system and create enabling documents before Thursday June 30th. Next week is going fly @ MACH 5 towards Thursday, day of voting on the budget.

Bear with me, but my team is under the gun to finalize costing by Monday. I need you to give priority to re-review the attached motion costing spreadsheet. Only need you to review motions assigned to your department that have amount columns and/or funding columns highlighted in yellow; review motions made before today and as of today. These columns are either blank and need your update. For the PARCS department, I have also entered in the Notes column that you confirm if the listed Measure P funding will be adding new appropriations or the motion's amount will be funded with existing appropriations. I am asking based on the FY23 Net Balance I'm seeing for Measure P funds (22701 and 22702). Missing cost estimates may have been addressed through a submitted memo sent to Council but between the volume of emails I've received along with finalizing motions, I need your input. My goal is to make sure that this motion list provides the costing & funding source with the utmost accuracy, reason I need your assistance.

I need your updates (highlighted cells in yellow) <u>ASAP</u>. Tomorrow would be amazing, but if need be I need your input no later than <u>Saturday, noon</u>. I can't stress the importance to complete this costing exercise as soon as possible due to the very short window next week to balance the budget. As you may anticipate, the budget deficit is huge. My best estimate is there are \$28M of motions without a funding source, while about \$19.6M is currently assigned to the GF. While I am focusing on the GF, I need final entries of the Non-GF as well.

Let me know if you have questions.

One more week to go.

My notes also discuss why a Mid-Year review should be considered and nexus of conducting a Mid-Year review to the City charter.

I have also included with this email the notes I handed out during our discussion on Thursday.

Please let me know how the Committee would like to proceed and if anything further is needed from me at this time. As discussed, I can make myself available to meet with you and / or your Council colleagues for further discussions.

City of Fresno Notes: Mid-Year Budget Review Policy Consideration Prepared: November 17, 2019

Why consider a Mid-Year Budget review and update?

- Update Beginning Fund Balance (prior year Carryover Fund Balance) based on actual pre-audit or audited results from the prior fiscal year.
- Conduct analysis of revenue trends (i.e. property tax true-up / sales taxes collected / development activity) since adoption of budget to revise revenue and /or ending fund balance projections.
- Conduct analysis of major expenditure categories (i.e. salaries / benefits / contractual costs / capital) since adoption of budget to revise expenditure levels and/or ending fund balance projections.
- Conduct analysis of updates to anticipated revenues and expenditures in the context of the multi-year forecast (General Fund) adjusting the forecast if necessary.
- Opportunity to transparently provide in-progress budget-to-actual information to City Council and public.
- Identification of any budget adjustments requiring City Council action, and recommendations for supplemental budget actions.

Budget Process – City of Fresno

- Budget Process defined in Sections 1202-1206 of the City of Fresno City Charter.
- Section 1206 discusses "supplementing" the budget as follows:
 - "At any meeting after the adoption of the budget, the Council may amend or supplement the budget by motion adopted by the affirmative votes of at least five members so as to authorize the transfer of unused balances appropriated for one purpose to another purpose <u>or to appropriate available funds not included in the</u> <u>budget</u>".
- Section 1206 seems to imply that a Mid-Year Budget with recommended changes to appropriations could be considered at any meeting after the budget is adopted.

Mid-Year Budget Review / Update Policy

- The City of San Diego (which, like the City of Fresno, has a Strong-Mayor form of government) has a policy related to budget development, adoption and review (Policy 000-02 as amended October 8, 2019).
- The San Diego Budget Policy outlines the Financial Reporting and Monitoring process (monthly) and discusses the preparation of a Mid-Year Budget Monitoring Report based on five to six months of actual results and anticipated spending trends for the remaining months of the fiscal year.
- The City of Fresno could consider developing a Mid-Year Budget Review Policy similar to that of the City of San Diego for the reasons noted above.

Dear Fresno City Councilmembers,

On behalf of Fresno Barrios Unidos and the undersigned organizations, we express our deep concern for the 2020 proposed budget for the City of Fresno. We ask for a re-examination of budget priorities to drive investments into the well-being of all community members through the **reallocation of funding towards a community based public health framework centered on equity and acknowledgment of social determinants of health.**

As stated in Mayor Brand's Transmittal Letter, the city's budget is a tool to build on four key initiatives: "economic prosperity, quality of life, public safety and unifying the community". The current budget demonstrates the city's priority: Policing. Police occupy the largest portion of city dollars. If approved, the Fresno police department will have a total budget of \$201,764,000. Police will receive 53% of the city's general fund amounting to \$184,783,400. Overall, 89% of FPD's budget relies on general funds.

Under this current model, public safety through policing dominates as the leading intervention to address health outcomes such as addiction, homelessness, mortality rates, trauma and blight in Fresno. To build a healthy and just Fresno, the city budget needs to shift away from public safety interventions to include and prioritize a public health framework. We believe no more than 50% of our general funds should be spent on policing.

We ask for a reallocation of 3% of the general fund to support efforts that address social determinants of health. Social determinants of health are the economic and social conditions that lead to health inequities. These are circumstances that can be improved with evidence-based interventions by cities. We envision a Fresno that integrates a health-promoting platform such as prioritizing stable housing, anti-displacement policies, equitable economic development, complete neighborhoods, addressing climate change, supporting immigrant health and wellbeing, and eliminating the historic legacy of discrimination in Fresno. In Fresno, the city can integrate documents and plans that list the many needs of the community.

To fully address the "quality of life and unifying the community" initiatives, we ask for a funded participatory budget process in 2020 that values, seeks, and integrates community input. A true participatory community budget process is needed to achieve this shift to center equitable community reinvestment. It is imperative that community members are engaged and given access to inform the city budget to address what affects their wellbeing.

We dream of a Fresno that centers community based decisions and prioritizes health interventions through a public health framework. Please take our concerns and recommendations into consideration.

Good afternoon Council President,

Thank you for looping me back into the discussion. So just to clarify, I expressed no opposition whatsoever to the City providing additional funding. I shared with the group that you and I had connected, and that I understood you to be very supportive of the City providing those additional funds. As you know, I was not part of the Council budget subcommittee discussions with the Administration and Budget Director. What was relayed to me, and what I shared with the truck re-routing RFP working group, is that the grand total of Council budget motions put the General Fund out of balance by over \$4 million. A number of motions were scaled back in the process. What came out of that process, and what was presented back to Council for the final budget adoption, was a budget that appropriated \$250,000 in Air District/AB 617 revenues to Public Works for the truck re-routing study; this was not included by the Council budget subcommittee within the list of General Fund motions to be funded. As I understand if \$250,000 in General Fund had been shifted to the truck rerouting study, then something else in the City's General Fund budget would have been reduced by \$250,000. As I shared with Ivanka and the group, I recommended that we proceed assuming the City will fund the additional \$250,000. I did not share with the group that the City will not be funding the \$250,000, but rather that it has not yet been approved. The appropriations are not there now, but I will work with the Budget office and the Administration to identify the funds and prepare a budget amendment (AAR) to include the dollars. Since we will not need those budget appropriations until the MOU/agreement with the Air District comes to the Council for approval, my recommendation is that we handle all of those items at the same time, very likely in February.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the 54th amendment to the Annual Appropriations Resolution (AAR) No. 2021-178 to appropriate \$36,530,800 from General Fund Surplus to various departments and purposes.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As part of the FY 2022 Midyear Budget, a reconciliation of actual and anticipated revenues and expenditures of the General Fund was completed. The results reflect an Annual Net Ending Balance higher than budgeted of \$32,253,200 (Table 1). On February 10, 2022, the Administration presented a workshop that offered recommendations to Council on proposed uses of these funds. After meeting with the City Council's Budget Subcommittee, the Administration is presenting the Subcommittee's revised recommendations included in Table 2.

BACKGROUND

During the February 10, 2022 Council Meeting the Administration presented the FY 2022 Mid-Year Budget Review Workshop which anticipated that the General Funds estimated year end revenues would exceed anticipated expenses and net transfers. This overall amount is projected to be \$32,253,200 as reflected by the Table 1 below.

TJ is the lead on this, I know enough to be dangerous. So, appropriate interviews would be TJ/Aaron or Shelby McNabb who is nails on the process and will probably present the item if it is for discussion. She is process queen, well spoken etc.

I don't know much about original motion, but we put this on in August 2022 with the same recommendations and a contract template with request for CM authorization to finalize agreements. Then the Council wanted to discuss, now we are returning with actual contracts/scopes vs. just the contract template.

In 2021, the City of Fresno was awarded ARPA funding in the amount of \$170,808,029. Of this funding, \$950,000 was approved in the FY23 budget process to provide grant funding to local Community Based Organizations for projects that address the public health impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic through violence intervention and prevention efforts. The FY23 budget also approved \$550,000 in General Funding toward violence intervention and prevention efforts. Collectively, this funding totals \$1,500,000 and has been allocated to the City of Fresno's Violence Intervention and Prevention Initiative which will administer grant funding for evidence-based activities that prevent and/or intervene the cycle of violence. Through a competitive grant solicitation process, 18 proposals were received totaling \$5,640,898. On August 11, 2022, staff brought the item before Council with recommendations for funding. At the request of Council, the item was pulled for further review and discussion by the Council Budget Subcommittee

RECOMMENDATION

The Administration recommends the Fresno City Council approve the 55th Amendment to the Annual Appropriations Resolution (AAR) No. 2021-178 to appropriate \$58,199,700 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to various departments and purposes for eligible uses as defined in the ARPA Final Rules, published as of January 6, 2022.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) is a \$1.9 trillion emergency relief measure authorized by Congress and signed into law by the President March 11, 2021, to address the adverse impacts of COVID-19 on public health and the national economy. The City of Fresno has been programmed to receive \$170,808,029, which will be paid in two tranches: May 2021 and May 2022. The City Council has previously approved the allocation of \$28,210,500, leaving an unallocated balance of \$142,597,529.

Based on the eligible uses defined in the ARPA Final Rules, the Administration recommends assigning \$58,199,700 from the full federal allotment for the projects identified in Table 1 via the 55th AAR Amendment.

BACKGROUND

During the February 10, 2022, Council Meeting, the Administration presented the Proposed ARPA Expenditure Plan workshop which provided recommendations as detailed on Table 1 under the '02/10/22 Proposed Allocation' column to the City Council for the apportionment of the remaining funds from the first tranche of the ARPA funding received in May of 2021. Subsequently to this presentation, the Administrations met with the City Council's Budget Subcommittee and is submitting the revised recommendations as identified on Table 1 under the 'Budget Subcommittee Recommendations' column to recognize the total of tranche 1, received in May of 2021 and of tranche 2, expected in May 2022.

The items indicating 51st AAR and 52nd AAR are being presented to the City Council for approval under separate cover. Upon approval by City Council, the remaining unallocated balance of ARPA funds will be \$64,622,929.

• Final Budget Motions at Council Today: Today was the day the Council was able to make any final motions and then vote on them (92 motions in total) for the next Council budget adoption meeting scheduled for June 30. These are motions (often with funding needs associated with them) for additional items beyond what was proposed in the budget.
In all of my years in Administration (19) I have never witnessed what happened at Council today. The Council made a motion to approve ALL 92 budget motions as presented – and it passed without discussion 7-0! Likely the Council Budget Subcommittee will be negotiating with the Mayor/CM over the next couple days to get to a budget they can agree on and afford. That said, at this time there are two motions related to Fire that we hope stick:

- 1. Identify funding to begin design and construction of Fire Station #12 and #10; in addition to bond up to \$60M to complete Phase 1 of the Regional Fire Training Center.
- 2. Identify \$500,000 to the acquisition of land for a new fire station in the South Industrial Triangle (Amazon area).

Administration has pushed meetings last week and this week with DPW and the CAO to discuss the percentage of fire impact fees that could be used to make 30-year bond payments to get some of these capital projects done. We are hopeful this will happen and the city will bond for construction needs at this time. Obviously there would need to be some a 30-year commitment from the General Fund to pay for the percentage that the fire impact fees cannot; we are estimating that portion would be around \$1M at this time.

Now, the Mayor can always veto any part of the budget and then the Council members would have to bring those parts back to be voted on and would need 5 votes to overturn his veto. We shall see how this plays out.

- T-shirts: Headquarters has new supplies of all 3 FFD optional shirts for various times of the year; Military/Camo, PRIDE, and Breast Cancer Awareness. We also have hats for Breast Cancer Awareness month available for purchase.
- Save-the-Date: Once again this year, the FFCF and Local 202 will be jointly hosting a tailgate event at the Fresno State Football game on September 10 (in the evening) against Oregon State. Fore \$25/ticket you get a t-shirt, food, beverages and entrance to the game. Once we have tickets we will let you know, however if you would like to call the front counter and reserve a number of tickets, the team will get a list going. Last year we sold 200 tickets.

Georgeanne,

I have a couple follow up items since we pushed our meeting to next week:

- Do you recall what the intent was by appropriating the \$3,458,000 Station 12 for debt service (as opposed to appropriating for actual construction costs). DPW notified us they are ready to move forward with an RFP for the demo phase of the project (existing building with all that blite the Council often complains about). With the appropriations being allocated for debt service, they are not eligible for demo costs. Unless there is an aspect to this that we're not seeing, my recommendation is to go to council requesting these appropriations be removed from the debt service fund and put into the Station 12 construction fund to allow for proceeding with the demo phase. You will recall that the original motion was for \$24M for design and construction of 12 and 10 and to bond up to \$60m for RTC. Of course that amount was reduced during negotiations with Budget subcommittee to the \$3.458 amount. My notes say the money was for debt service. Having said that, we can discuss internally other options. OK let me know how you would like us to proceed in funding the demolition (going out to bid soon).
- Its been a couple years since the Fire Department raised any Fire Fees. Our recommendation is to raise the fees by 13%, which is CPI over the last 2 years. We estimate this will increase revenues by approximately \$500,000 annually. Totally confused here. We just raised Fire

Impact Fees by 11% on single family and 12% on multi family. Or are you talking about inspection fees?? Sorry, yes this is for inspection fees and related, not impact fees.

- What is the City's position on charging electric cars at city facilities. I'm sure the fire department is not the only department having is employees drive electric cars to work. With the Governor's push for electric cars this will likely become more prevalent. Can City employees plug their cars in to charge at city facilities; specifically can firefighters who park their cars for 2 days at a time for their work days, charge them at the fire stations. Want to get in front of this. Good question. I'm assuming when you say "charge" you mean plug into a wall or do you have charging stations at your fire stations? There are currently no charging stations at fire stations, so this would mean plugging into a wall at the station (guess they can purchase a converter cable or something).
- If for some reason we do not get awarded a SAFER grant, I would like to fill the vacancies and hold a 15-17 person academy. This would mean we would need 4 positions added to the PAR (1 BC, 1 Captain, 1 FFS, 1 Firefighter) if you want to fully realize savings in Shift Replacement Overtime with a maximum relief pool of (7 Captains, 7 FFS, 10 Firefighters and 1 BC). If you don't want to add to the PAR now, we would hire for 6-6-9 in the relief pool and have an academy of 12-15. Let me know what you would like to do. Need to discuss financial implications of this with my team.
- Oct. 19: We are working with ISD to host a Town Hall Live Zoom meeting for the general population firefighter recruitment. Similar to what we did a couple years ago, it was well attended by over 800 people. The goal is to get the word out, identify what someone would need to qualify to take the test (EMT Cert, age 20 to apply, DL) and offer a written test in January 2023. You are welcome to attend and/or participate if you like. Thank you. Would this be to fill an academy as described in the previous bullet? No, this would create a list for future hiring over the next two years (if needed).

Hi Toni,

Can you please put a memo to Council together please?

During the FY2023 Mid-Year Budget Review presented to Council on February 23, 2023, Council member Arias indicated that he was still struggling to make sense of information provide by staff regarding the Animal Center budget. The purpose of this memorandum is to clarify the information that was provided to Council on the January 5^{th,} 2023 meeting, where Deputy City Manager Alma Torres, indicated that the budget for FY2023 was approximately \$7 million when discussing the payoff of the Roeding Business Park Loan and the reallocation of funds from the animal center to fund this payoff.

The FY2023 Proposed Budget included \$9,895,000 for the Animal Center. During the FY2023 Budget negotiations between the Administration and the Budget Subcommittee \$1 million of this funding was reduced and allocated to fund the agreed upon council motions. Although the reallocation is identified in the FY2023 Adopted Budget under Council Motions (see attachment 1), the Animal Center Services and Operational Costs narrative did not get updated accordingly. The FY2023 Adopted Budget for the Animal Center should indicate \$8,895,000.

Since Council was being asked to reallocate appropriations from the Animal Center, Deputy City Manager Alma Torres attempted to provide the most current information available at the time for transparency based on the matter at hand and included transactions that had been scheduled in the \$8,895,000 for FY2023 but ended up occurring in FY2022 which would reduce the amount of available one- time funding in FY2023 for the animal center. These transactions included:

- \$1,044,800 for the acquisitions of vehicles.
- \$650,000 for site improvements and installation of a generator at the animal center.

Combined with the reallocation of the \$1 million to fund Council Motions, these total changes equaled \$2,694,800 less than the published amount of \$9,895,000 or \$7,202,200 or the estimated \$7 million provided to Council. Our sincere apologies for lacking to provide this clarity during the discussion in the dais, it was not our intent to create confusion, rather to provide the Council with the most current information that would allow you to make a fully informed decision.

Staff is available to discuss if additional information is necessary.

One Fresno Family:

It is an honor to present the Dyer Administration's Adopted Budget for Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24). Consistent with previous years, this budget supports the ONE FRESNO vision which promotes and implements an inclusive, prosperous, beautiful city where people take pride in their neighborhood and community, and provides a government that listens, keeps its promises, and is owned by the people. In pursuing this vision, we continue to strive each day to have a culture that demonstrates – we work for you.

In my adopted "we work for you" budget, public safety remains the foundation on which all else is built. The FY24 Budget also prioritizes Beautify Fresno, Homelessness and Housing, and Investing in our Youth. Each of these priorities are in addition to essential services the City of Fresno (City) provides daily to our residents, such as repairing streets and sidewalks, picking up trash, ensuring our water and sewer systems are safe and reliable, and maintaining timely and efficient public transportation. This budget reflects these priorities and builds upon the considerable progress made during the last two fiscal years.

The FY24 Adopted Budget totals \$1,871,906,200. Of that, General Fund departments account for \$484,889,200, while Enterprise and Internal Service departments total \$855,930,000. The remaining \$531,087,000 is comprised of special revenue sources such as Measure C, Measure P, various grants, and other capital funds. Throughout this budget message, I hope to offer insights into the coming year, and acknowledge our accomplishments and investments – all while encouraging our team each year to reach new heights and to set and meet even more ambitious goals.

As part of my Administration's efforts to maintain the City's long-term financial stability, the General Fund reserve balance is projected to be fully funded at 10%, or \$45,921,900 by the end of FY24. The City's fiscal condition remains healthy. I am proud to report that the City's credit rating was recently upgraded by all three major credit rating agencies – Standard & Poor's, Moody's and Fitch all agree that the City's financial position is strong and improving. A strong credit rating lowers the City's interest rates when we go to sell bonds.

Sales tax growth is projected at 2.5% and property tax growth is projected at 4.25%. Additionally, employee positions are funded at 90% based on historical attrition data. In planning for FY24, there are several notable considerations and adjustments, including increased expenses and a leveling of tax revenues, as described further:

- FY23 saw significant investment in one of the City's most valuable resources our hard-working employees. Total personnel increases in FY24 are \$37,576,300.
- Due to ongoing rate increases, we projected PG&E costs to rise to \$42,050,457. By comparison, FY21 costs were \$25,770,981, which represents a \$16.3 million increase in just three years. I will continue to voice opposition to the California Public Utilities Commission on these unsustainable increases as well as explore other alternatives to lower rates.
- Measure P Sales Tax was initially estimated to annually generate \$35 million beginning July 1, 2021. Internal calculations for Measure P far exceeded the \$35 million, and was forecast to generate \$58,344,000, which was then programmed into the FY23 budget. However, these projections were in error due to a Measure P formula miscalculation that included State and County sales tax pools, and was based on sales tax projections that were too high. A more accurate calculation, based on appropriate sales tax projections, results in a Measure P revenue estimate of \$48,222,200 for FY24.
- The FY24 Budget assumed the existing rate structure for both Water and Wastewater Divisions of the Department of Public Utilities. However, the Solid Waste Management Division (collection, recyclables, green waste, Operation Clean-Up) relies on a projected rate increase in FY24. Solid Waste has seen significant cost increases in equipment, vehicles, fleet maintenance and repairs, fuel, PG&E, and personnel. The last Solid Waste rate increase was in 2009. To remain solvent, the division has depleted its reserve fund, deferred much-needed maintenance and equipment purchases, and left positions unfilled. A public vetting process is anticipated during FY24 to address the potential rate increase and improved service levels for Solid Waste, and funding has been budgeted for that process. While all three divisions face financial challenges related to the cap on current rates, the Solid Waste Management Division's situation is particularly dire.

Community Safety and Trust

During the past year, much progress has been made to enhance community safety and trust within the Police Department. The prior two budget cycles prioritized recruitment of sworn personnel, with the goal of being at full strength by the end of FY24. In FY21, the department was authorized at 838 officer positions. In the Adopted FY24 budget, that number has grown to 900, with the potential to increase to 926 in the coming weeks due to increased outside funding that will fully fund the additional positions. Year-to-date violent crime is down over 15% and homicides have decreased by over 40%, with residential and business burglaries down over 26% and 46% respectively. Increased staffing levels and partnerships have been key to these successes.

Police Department: The FY24 Adopted Budget includes the following:

- Sworn Officers: Funding for 900 sworn positions. In April 2023, 12 of those officers were added with the City's acceptance of a Community Oriented Policing Services grant, which pays for approximately one-third of an officer's cost for three years
- Dispatcher Hiring: During FY23, contract modifications were made for Emergency Services Dispatchers (ESD), making them the highest compensated in the San Joaquin Valley. This was done to improve recruitment and reduce attrition. Currently, 111 full-time ESDs, six Supervisors, and one Manager make up the Dispatch Unit, which operates seven days a week, 24 hours a day
 - The FY24 Adopted Budget includes the addition of two Supervisors, four ESD II positions, and two ESD III positions for a total of eight new positions in addition to the 10 added since FY21
- ShotSpotter: The FY24 Budget continues funding for the ShotSpotter Gunshot Detection System to cover 14.26 square miles, and an additional \$61,200 to cover contractual increases
- Equipment and Materials for New Hires:
 - Replacement equipment for 80 new officers hired to cover attrition (\$239,000)

Re: Cease and Desist, Fresno City's Budget Committee

Dear Honorable Members of the Fresno City Council:

We write on behalf of Fresnoland Media, the American Civil Liberties Union of Northern California and the First Amendment Coalition to express concern regarding the recent reports that the Fresno City Council engaged in ongoing closed-door deliberations about its budget process and to notify the Council of several related violations of the Ralph M. Brown Act. Cal. Gov't Code 54950 *et seq.*¹ The Council's conduct namely holding secret committee meetings about Fresno's budget process without any notice or opportunity for the public to comment on such process flies in the face of democratic principles. This letter serves as a demand to **cease and desist** the practice of conducting budget deliberations in secret.

Fresno's Budget Process

On August 16, 2023, *Fresnoland* published a news article reporting that during the final rush to adopt a budget before its deadline, Fresno Mayor Jerry Dyer's team "met with the budget subcommittee several times over eight days behind closed doors."² Behind those closed-door discussions, "m ore than 75 changes and amendments to the proposed budget emerged from those meetings totaling almost \$30 million."³ As the mayor admitted, "A lot of sausage was being made in the back room."

The budget committee is composed of three of the seven City councilmembers and has been repeatedly meeting in secret since at least 2018 during each year's budget process.⁴ As reported by *Fresnoland*, there is no paperwork that confirms the dissolution of the committee following the passage of a budget every year.⁵

The budget committee meets every January for a "mid-year review" and "again during June for the budget process."⁶ The primary purpose of the committee is to reconcile the mayor's budget priorities with the Council's budget priorities.

During the 2023 budget process, the budget committee started its secret committee meetings on or around June 16, 2023.⁷ The task of the committee, as described by Councilmember Tyler Maxwell, was to "either remove some of the mayor's items and replace them with the council's items or take out some of the council motions."⁸

Similarly, Councilmember Luis Chavez described the subcommittee's purpose as taking the Council's budget priorities "into the back room and negotiat ing on behalf of the council."⁹ The backroom deals culminated in the adoption of a record-breaking \$1.87 billion City budget that was approved by the Council on June 22, 2023.

Regardless of whether the budget committee is formally an advisory body, its detailed deliberations are effectively the final word on the complex policy and financial decisions embodied in the City's budget. As Councilmember Chavez said of the committee's discussions, "The council has outlined the vision, the mayor has brought forward his recommendation, and now it's time to actually reconcile those two but also make sure you're including key investments . So by the time it came back, it was pretty spot on, and there was not a lot of discussion or debate out on the dais" at the City Council meeting where the budget was approved.¹⁰

The City of Fresno is one of the largest cities in California by population that does not utilize an open, public budget committee. The budget committees of the Los Angeles, San Diego, San Francisco, Sacramento, Long Beach, Oakland, Anaheim, and Bakersfield city councils all hold their meetings in public.¹¹ Thus, it is troubling that Fresno's budget committee deliberated in secret on a record-breaking budget that impacts all its residents.

The Brown Act

Our state constitution could not be clearer on the fundamental right to open government. "The people have the right of access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business, and, therefore, the meetings of public bodies and the writings of public officials and agencies shall be open to public scrutiny." Cal. Const., Art. I, 3(b)(1).

To that end, the Brown Act declares, "The people of this State do not yield their sovereignty to the agencies which serve them. The people, in delegating authority, do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know. The people insist on remaining informed so that they may retain control over the instruments they have created." 54950.

A law such as the Brown Act "shall be broadly construed if it furthers the people's right of access, and narrowly construed if it limits the right of access." Cal. Const., Art. I, 3(b)(2); *see also, e.g., Julian Volunteer Fire Co. Assn. v. Julian-Cuyamaca Fire Prot. Dist.*, 62 Cal. App. 5th 583, 601 (2021) (noting Brown Act's provisions must be "construed liberally in favor of openness in conducting public business").

The Brown Act's central purpose is to ensure that the public has an opportunity to oversee the actions of its representatives and provide informed and meaningful input to a legislative body before that body can take any action. The Act therefore mandates, "All meetings of the legislative body of a local agency shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meeting of the legislative body of a local agency," except for limited provisions authorizing closed sessions. 54953(a).

The Act also requires that all meetings conducted by legislative bodies must absent any emergency situation be publicized in advance, follow a noticed agenda, be accessible, and provide an opportunity for the public to comment. 54954–54954.3, 54954.5–54956.5, 54956.7–54957.10, 54962.

Nowhere are these requirements more important than in the budget process, given "the strong public interest in knowing how the government spends its money." *International Fed'n of Pro. & Tech. Engineers, Local 21, AFL-CIO v. Superior Court of Alameda Cnty.*, 42 Cal. 4th 319, 333 (2007). Disregarding the compelling public interest in transparency, the City of Fresno has repeatedly violated the Brown Act by conducting budget committee deliberations in secret, without any notice, agenda, or opportunity for the public to comment.

The available facts demonstrate that the budget committee is a "legislative body" subject to the Brown Act because it was "created by charter, ordinance, resolution, or formal action" and is a "standing committee" with "a continuing subject matter jurisdiction," if not "a meeting schedule fixed by charter, ordinance, resolution, or formal action of a legislative body," regardless of whether it is "advisory" or composed of "less than a quorum" of the City Council, 54952(b).

As evidenced in a document cited by *Fresnoland*, the budget committee was apparently created by the City Council on or about June 21, 2018, and its members are appointed by the City Council.¹² That is more than sufficient to establish "formal action" creating the committee. *See Frazer v. Dixon Unified School Dist.*, 18 Cal. App. 4th 781, 792-93 (1993); *Joiner v. City of Sebastopol*, 125 Cal. App. 3d 799, 801 (1981).

Under any construction of the Brown Act, broad or otherwise, the facts show that the budget committee has been a standing committee with continuing subject matter jurisdiction over budget matters since its formation, regardless of whether it has had a regular meeting schedule. In reality, the budget committee has regularly exercised "the responsibility of providing advice on budgets" to the City Council, and therefore it is "subject to the notice, agenda, and public participation requirements of the Act." 79 Ops. Cal. Att'y. Gen. 69 (1996).

Given the "purposes and requirements" of the Brown Act, courts "must follow function over form in carrying out the Legislature's purposes" to guarantee open government and accountability. *Id.* Any disclaimer that the budget committee is ad hoc or does "not exercise continuing subject matter jurisdiction," is not "determinative" of whether the committee is subject to the Brown Act. *Id.* actual function, the budget committee is a legislative body that has routinely violated the Brown Act's core requirements of open public meetings with notice, agenda, and opportunity for public comment.

Cease and Desist Demand

To address and remedy the concerns expressed in this letter, we demand that the Council ensure that the budget committee ceases and desists from conducting its deliberations in secret and in violation of the Brown Act. The Council must acknowledge the Brown Act violation set forth in this letter by making an unconditional commitment to refrain from keeping its budget committee closed to the public and to conduct all future budget committee meetings in accordance with the Act's requirements set for legislative bodies. The Council has 30 days from receiving this cease and desist letter to provide the unconditional commitment, which must be approved by the Council in open session during a regular or special meeting as a separate item of business on the non-consent agenda. If the Council fails or refuses to ensure that the budget committee ceases and desists its secret meetings, we may file an action pursuant to 54960.2, in which case, we will seek an award of court costs and reasonable attorney fees pursuant to 54960.5.

The Council should also take note that the City is potentially exposed to Brown Act liability to the extent its other standing committees are also violating the Brown Act by meeting in secret. If such issues are not addressed, they may become the subject of a future cease and desist letter or Brown Act litigation.

Re: Response by City of Fresno to Cease and Desist Letter

Dear Ms. Salceda:

This correspondence responds to your letter dated September 5, 2023, concerning "recent reports" that the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee (comprised of less than a quorum of city councilmembers) for the Fiscal Year 2023/24 budget is violating the Brown Act by not having public meetings as a standing committee.

As a threshold matter, your threats of litigation against the City of Fresno (City) are moot because the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee was dissolved on June 23, 2023, when the Fiscal Year 2023/24 City budget was approved by the City Council.

Additionally, the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee for the Fiscal Year 2023/24 budget was only in existence between January 19, 2023 until June 23, 2023 (less than six months). The primary authority that your letter relies on is California Attorney General Opinion No. 95-614 (June 10, 1996). However, the subcommittee that was at issue there did not have a limited term (unlike here where the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee for the Fiscal Year 2023/24 budget was in existence for less than six months).

The Fresno City Council approved the Fiscal Year 2023/24 City budget in open session at a city council meeting (after receiving public comments) on June 22, 2023, and the agenda package for that city council meeting was posted on the City's website and made publicly available on June 16, 2023. Every budget-related hearing included public comment. Thus, there is no basis for your claims that the City lacked transparency in adopting the City budget.

While this dispute is moot and the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee has been dissolved, the City is also providing a response to your arguments that the Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee, which is no longer in existence and lasted less than six months, allegedly violated the Brown Act.

Specifically, your letter contains no analysis about the Fresno City Charter. While you argue that other cities in California handle their budget subcommittees as standing committees, you have not considered that each charter city in California operates

differently based on the procedures established in their city charters (as approved by the voters of that city).

Under Fresno City Charter Section 400, subsections (d) and (f), the Mayor prepares the City budget and the City Council does not control the Mayor and the City Manager's decisions on how to prepare the budget. Unlike most cities, a council ad hoc subcommittee cannot direct the preparation of the budget because the Mayor and City Manager have the subject matter jurisdiction for budget preparation per the Fresno City Charter.

Additionally, under Fresno City Charter Section 400, the Mayor is in charge of directing the City Manager and not the City Council. Therefore, an Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee (comprised of less than a quorum of city councilmembers) has no power to control how City staff prepares the City budget (unlike in most cities in California where a city council has the power to hire and fire a city manager).

Moreover, the legal authority cited in your letter is also distinguishable (as explained above) and there is authority that is more closely on point in this matter. For example, in *Taxpayers for Livable Communities v. City of Malibu* (2005) 126 Cal.App.4th 1123, the trial court ruled that no Brown Act violation occurred because the ad hoc council subcommittee there did not have subject matter jurisdiction over the matter the ad hoc was reviewing. The trial court's ruling was affirmed by the Court of Appeal.

There, in September 2001, the Coastal Commission released for public comment a draft of one component of Malibu's eventual LCP, a Land Use Plan (LUP). In the months following, two of the five members of Malibu's City Council, Jennings and House, held a number of private meetings with various individuals, constituents, and city staff to "go over the City's response to the Coastal Commission's draft LUP." Jennings and House did not invite the general public to their meetings. At the Malibu City Council's regular session in December 2001, Jennings and House submitted to the City Council their recommendations on how Malibu should respond to the draft LUP.

The Court of Appeal held that Jennings and House did not meet as members of the City of Malibu's Land Use and Planning Committee. The Land Use and Planning Committee had jurisdiction over planning and zoning code enforcement. It did not, however, have jurisdiction over Malibu's response to the Coastal Commission's LUP for Malibu. The Malibu City Council had instead reserved to itself jurisdiction over the City's response to the commission's plans. (*Id.* at pp. 1127 – 1128) Additionally, the Court held that Jennings and House could not bind the Malibu City Council because the Council kept for itself all future decisions involving the LUP by placing the plan on its agenda as a permanent item until resolved. (*Id.* at pp. 1128 – 1129)

Here, the Fresno City Council does not have subject matter jurisdiction over the preparation of the City budget (as explained above) per the Fresno City Charter stating that function is controlled by the Mayor and not by the City Council. Thus, the same line of reasoning that the Court of Appeal applied in the *City of Malibu* case applies here.

Additionally, under Fresno Municipal Code Section 2-316, the Council President appoints special committees rather than the City Council as a whole. For example, in *Farron v*.

City and County of San Francisco (1989) 216 Cal.App.3d 1071, a lawsuit was filed against the City and County of San Francisco seeking a temporary restraining order to prevent a mayoral appointed task force from meeting in private, a declaration that the task force was subject to the open meeting requirements of the Brown Act and a writ of mandate compelling the task force to hold its meetings in public. The task force was formed by the mayor to formulate legislation creating permanent zoning controls regarding the demolition of single family houses, and it included two of the five members of the City's board of supervisors.

The Court of Appeal held that the task force was not a legislative body within the meaning of Government Code Section 54952. The Court found that there was no evidence that the members of the board of supervisors were appointed to the task force to represent the board's interests, the city's charter did not require board members to serve on the task force nor were there any bylaws of the task force requiring such participation, and there was no evidence that the board of supervisors required its members to serve on the task force or exercised any control over their actions.

Thus, the Court held that the members of the Board Of Supervisors did not serve on the task force in their official capacity. The Court also held that since the Mayor created the task force rather than the Board of Supervisors as a whole it was not a standing committee. (*Id.* at p. 1075)

Here, you claim that there is a potential dispute that could arise in the future concerning if the Fresno City Council President could decide to form or not form an Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee for the Fiscal Year 2024/25 budget is premature and not ripe for judicial review.

The request at the end of your letter that the City provide assurances that any future Ad Hoc Budget Subcommittee will be a standing committee is a hypothetical situation that does not require a response under Government Code Section 54960.1. As explained above, cities can form Ad Hoc Subcommittees without being required to treat all Ad Hoc Subcommittees as standing committees.

In closing, there is no legal basis for requiring any further action be taken by the Fresno City Council concerning this matter for the reasons that are explained above.
